P.L.A.Y. Mission Statement

Prior Lake Athletics for Youth serves the Prior Lake / Savage School District, to provide competitive yet fun athletic opportunities for kids. Our priority is safety, skills development, and the teaching of life lessons through sports.

Our program promotes the importance of sportsmanship, teamwork, leadership, and integrity. We believe learning both success and failure through competition will benefit our future generations.

Guide Overview

This guide provides an overview of the P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball program to help parents, families, coaches and players to better understand the components, process and expectations for the travel season including the pre-season, tryouts, team selections and the season.

The P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball program operations is managed by a group of volunteers in managerial type roles. For this document that group will be referred to as “The Board”.

The Board reserves the right to edit this document and any other program documents, policies, procedures at any time for the benefit of the program.

Policies, procedures and other statements laid out in this document are in addition to the MBL/MBT/MYAS policies and procedures.

Program Overview

P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball provides competitive baseball across the Twin Cities metro area for players in 3rd grade through 9th grade (9U-14/15U). P.L.A.Y. is an association member of the Metro Baseball League (MBL – <https://mbl.bz>). Travel Baseball is an earned opportunity that presents a higher level of commitment, player development, and competition compared to in-house play.

Teams are formed based on player skill, following MBL and other league structures, with AAA, AA, and A-level teams competing against similarly ranked opponents. The number and size of the team’s rosters are not finalized until after tryouts, where players have the chance to earn a spot on a travel team. Players will try out with a potential to earn a roster spot on a team. Those not selected are placed on an in-house team.

Travel teams will then play a regular season against other MBL teams in a region/division format determined by the MBL. Teams also play in weekend tournaments against teams from MBL and other leagues from the metro area and surrounding states. Success in these tournaments can earn teams a spot in year-end state tournaments.

Guiding Principles

P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball members, coaches, families, and players are expected to uphold these principles in policies, conduct, and accountability, ensuring a focus on safety, retention, and player development.

- **Players first** – We prioritize a positive environment focused on player safety, participation, and development, with support from the Board, coaches, families, and spectators.
- **Fairness** – Our program upholds fairness in evaluations, team and coach selections, and overall operations, with regular Board reviews to maintain integrity.
- **Objectivity** – Decisions on player evaluations, team placements, and in-season actions are based solely on ability, free from personal bias or outside influence.
- **Accountability** – All players, coaches, parents, and volunteers must adhere to P.L.A.Y. policies, demonstrating composure and serving as positive role models.

Participating in P.L.A.Y. Sports is a privilege that brings pride to athletes and their families while requiring a strong commitment to representing their team, coaches, and community.

Eligibility

P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball players must play in the grade level they are currently in. Players are not allowed to ‘play-up or play-down’ in Travel Baseball. The only exception is if the player does not meet the age requirement and is older for their grade, then the player will be placed at the level-up that matches the age specified on the MBL website. If players are young for their grade, they will still play their grade level.

Grade/Level requirements:

- 9U – 3rd grade, 10U – 4th, 11U – 5th, 12U – 6th, 13U – 7th, 14/15U – 8th/9th

Players must live within the Prior Lake School district or attend a Prior Lake public school. Players that do not meet residency requirements must receive MBL approval, the player’s home association approval and P.L.A.Y. approval for an exception. Exceptions are a rare occurrence.

Players are not permitted to ‘double roster’, meaning if they participate in P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball they cannot be rostered on a club team or another baseball team during the P.L.A.Y. baseball season.

What To Expect – Program Commitments

Teams can expect 3–4 baseball activities per week, typically two games and one or two practices. During tournament weeks, this may increase to six days with up to seven games.

Tournaments: 9U–10U: Three weekend tournaments, 11U–14U: Four weekend tournaments

Season: 14 regular-season games (9U–14U)

Postseason: Teams must participate in at least two postseason events, such as MBL playoffs, MBT State, MYAS Gopher State, or MSF Tournament (mid-late July). Additional participation requires team vote and board approval.

Players are expected to attend all practices and games. Before tryouts, both players and parents must sign the P.L.A.Y. Player Commitment Form, outlining expectations and consequences for absences, including reduced playing time or removal from the program. Full commitment is essential for player and team development.

Playing Time Expectations

P.L.A.Y. focuses on player development while ensuring fair playing time. Coaches will follow requirements, though injuries or behavior may affect participation.

Minimum Innings Played Per Game:

- 9U–11U: 4 innings (league & tournament)
- 12U–13U: 4 innings (league), 3 innings (tournament)
- 14U–15U: 3 innings (league), 2 innings (tournament)

Batting Order: Continuous in all league games.

League Games: Designed for development, allowing players to grow in multiple roles:

- 9U–13U: Minimum three different positions
- 14U–15U: Minimum two different positions

Tournament Games: Lakers compete to win. Coaches make decisions based on team success while considering player skills, preferences, and opportunities in both infield and outfield.

Tryouts and Team Selection

Players must try out to earn a roster spot. Evaluations are conducted fairly and without bias, using a structured assessment to determine skill levels.

During tryouts, players participate in multiple skill stations, including fielding, throwing, hitting, running, pitching, and potentially catching. Each station is independently evaluated by a

contracted third-party group of professional youth baseball evaluators. To ensure fairness, board members, coaches, or volunteers with participating players are removed from the tryout area. The evaluation process is reviewed and adjusted as needed each season to maintain its effectiveness.

To uphold the integrity of the process, players are assigned numbers and cannot wear identifying clothing, such as named jerseys or club-based apparel, ensuring evaluators assess players solely on performance. For those without a prior season's coach evaluation, an additional session is held during tryout week, allowing players to complete another round of the same stations to gather more comprehensive assessment data.

Team Selections

Once tryouts are completed the data from evaluations as well as the previous year's coaches evaluations, if applicable, are put together to form a score. To ensure the fairness and unbiased process there are only three people that see the actual rankings. These are the Vice President, the Systems Manager and a member of the P.L.A.Y. Executive Board (The Administrator or President). Board members, including Grade Level Managers, are treated as 'parents' and are not allowed to see the raw tryout and coach evaluation results. After the players are ranked they are pooled into AAA, AA, and A groups for team selections.

After evaluations are finalized, the head coach meets with the Grade Level Manager, Travel Director, Systems Manager, and Vice President to complete team selections. The coach is provided an alphabetized list of players assigned to that specific level, along with the eligible selection pool for that team. Coaches only see players within their designated level and do not have access to the full grade-level rankings, nor can they select players outside of their assigned pool. All selections must be based on baseball-related reasons, with decisions focused on team needs and overall roster balance.

Note – For 9U there is no selection process. Players ranked 1-12 are placed on AAA, players 13-36 are placed on two balanced AA teams. In 2026, a 9A team is being reviewed and will also be systematically selected for players 37-48. Players ranked 49+ are placed on In-House teams if the families choose.

Once a team is chosen it is validated and approved by the board members present and the roster is marked final. Rosters are set at 12 players, any deviation from that size will require approval from the P.L.A.Y. Executive Board. Players at the A level that are not chosen are placed in the In-House program if the player chooses to.

Rosters are posted the night of the team selection and are final. Any player that leaves the program after rosters are posted will not receive any portion of a refund as communicated in registration.

Codes of Conduct

The Board, in partnership with the MBL, establishes policies to support our mission of providing competitive, development-focused opportunities in a safe and positive environment. Codes of conduct apply to players, parents, spectators, and coaches. Failure to follow these standards may result in disciplinary action based on the severity of the offense.

Discipline may include reduced playing time, suspension, or removal from a team for players; removal from events or future attendance restrictions for parents and spectators; and suspension or removal of coaching duties for coaches. Reinstatement may require review by the MBL. No refunds will be issued for players removed from the program.

Player's Pledge

Players that earned a spot on a travel baseball team will:

- Treat teammates, coaches, parents, and opponents with respect.
- Always try my best.
- Prioritize P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball over other sports or non-academic activities during the season.
- Make every effort to attend practices/games and notify coaches in advance if I must miss.
- Accept umpire calls and follow the rules of the game.
- Respect equipment, fields, and facilities, and follow all rules.
- Control my emotions and verbal outbursts.
- Never use profanity.
- Have fun.

Parent's Pledge

A parent/guardian of a P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball player will:

- Ensure transportation to and from all games and practices.
- Volunteer for team management, field maintenance, tournaments, concessions, etc.
- Plan family activities to avoid conflicts with team events, and notify coaches in case of unavoidable conflicts. Family vacations should be scheduled for after the baseball season.
- Prioritize the players, maintaining responsible and respectful conduct towards coaches, opponents, and umpires.
- Follow the **Dispute Resolution Process** and the **24-Hour Rule** (see Appendix). This means that for any on-field issue, whether during practice, a game, in-person situation, or other incidents, at least 24 hours must pass before addressing it with the coach, grade level

manager, or any board member. Emails sent within the 24-hour period will not be addressed.

Spectators Pledge

All spectators (parents, relatives, friends, etc.) must follow P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball policies during games and practices. The head coach is responsible for the conduct of the team's spectators, and if a spectator is ejected, the head coach may also be ejected at the umpire's discretion.

- Spectators must be respectful of the umpires.
- Spectators must be respectful of the opponent's players, coaches, and spectators.
- Spectators must be respectful of the team's players and coaches.
- Spectators are not allowed in the dugout to express criticisms or for any non-emergency reason (Dugouts are "No Fly Zones").
- Profanity or vulgarity is prohibited.
- Failure to comply may result in ejection from the game or park for the duration of the game or tournament.
- Playing music during the game (from first inning to last inning) is prohibited at all times and locations (home, away, or tournament).

Coaches

As a P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball Coach, your role is to teach fundamentals, help players develop skills, and represent Prior Lake with pride and sportsmanship. Feedback from parents and coaches is collected each year to assess performance and guide improvements for the program. Expectations for coaches continue to rise.

Any adult is eligible to coach, but all coaches must be reviewed, interviewed, and screened by the board. Coaches must complete required training per P.L.A.Y. policies and state laws. Head coaches are selected after tryouts, and assistant coaches are chosen post-team selection, with recommendations from the head coach subject to board approval. Coaching positions are not guaranteed each season, and the review process restarts annually.

Travel Baseball is a competitive program, and coaches are expected to lead teams to meet high standards. Coaches are evaluated and selected based on a variety of criteria, including prior baseball coaching experience or coaching experience in other sports, their relationships with players and reputation in the community, communication and organizational skills, commitment to the time demands, knowledge of the game of baseball, and overall demeanor.

Coach's Pledge

- I will treat athletes, coaches, parents, and officials with respect and dignity.
- I will accept umpire rulings or resolve disputes through respectful conversation.
- I will not use or encourage the use of profanity.
- I will not use or be under the influence of tobacco, drugs, or alcohol at any baseball events, including games, practices, or pre-season sessions involving our athletes
- I will not encourage unsportsmanlike conduct from anyone.
- I will prioritize the emotional and physical well-being of my players over winning.
- I will ensure a safe playing environment for my players.
- I will remember the game is for children, not adults.
- I will not engage in behavior that endangers anyone's health, safety, or well-being.
- I will not engage in or encourage threats, abuse, or physical confrontations.

Team Manager

Each team will have a Team Manager, a parent volunteer responsible for administrative tasks separate from coaching duties. The head coach selects the Team Manager after rosters are finalized, and training will be provided before the season.

Team Managers are not members of the coaching staff, may not enter the dugout, participate in game planning, or manage team statistics, and may not be the spouse of the head coach.

Responsibilities include managing team funds, collecting required player and coach documentation (birth certificates, Concussion, SAFE Sport, PCA certifications), tournament check-in, arranging hotel blocks, and submitting state tournament payments.

Volunteer Hours

P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball relies on volunteers to ensure its success, with families contributing during tryouts, fundraisers, tournaments, and other events. Each season, we host 20+ tournaments, generating revenue to maintain and improve fields and player registration fees.

Families are expected to volunteer 8 hours per player, with a 12-hour cap per family if multiple players are involved. A \$500 check per player is required for the 2026 season, serving as a commitment to try out. If volunteer hours are fulfilled, the check will be shredded. If not, the check will be cashed and added to the program revenue. If you know in advance that you can't fulfill the hours, notify the Volunteer Manager so the funds can be used to hire replacement workers.

Use Of Technology

P.L.A.Y. allows the use of technology tools like cameras and stat trackers, but tracking statistics is limited to personal use by parents/family for their own player. Coaches and parents may only publicly share basic game information (balls, strikes, outs, score, innings, and player names), not detailed stats like batting averages or strikeouts. Coaches are the only ones permitted to track all team statistics.

If a team uses electronic scoring or streaming services, the VP of Baseball and Travel Director must be added as fans. P.L.A.Y. does not cover any fees or costs associated with these services, and team funds cannot be used. Any additional costs must be covered by individual contributions, not the whole team.

Dispute Resolution and 24-Hour Rule

All P.L.A.Y. participants - including players, parents, coaches, officials, volunteers, and affiliated organizations - agree to follow this Dispute Resolution Process as the exclusive method for resolving grievances related to P.L.A.Y. activities.

A dispute is defined as any conflict or disagreement arising from P.L.A.Y. participation, including concerns about tryouts, team placement, playing time, positioning, coaching decisions, teammate conflicts, officials, rule interpretations, code of conduct violations, or disciplinary actions. Private matters unrelated to P.L.A.Y. activities are not subject to this process.

A violation of P.L.A.Y. policy by one individual does not justify a violation by another.

24-Hour Rule

Unless immediate safety concerns exist, participants must wait 24 hours after an incident before initiating the dispute process. This cooling-off period promotes productive, solution-focused communication. Grievances raised before 24 hours will not be addressed.

Dispute Resolution Process

All Participants should attempt to resolve disputes expeditiously and fairly at the lowest possible level within the following Dispute Resolution Process:

1. If possible, have your child be an advocate for themselves and speak to the coach directly with any questions or concerns. Parent(s) and/or Guardian(s) are welcome to be a part of any athlete-driven conversations.
2. If the first dialogue does not produce a resolution, A parent/guardian may contact the coach with the goal of having an objective and productive conversation.
3. If this dialogue does not produce a resolution, the conversation should be brought via email to the following (in order): Grade Level Manager, Sport Assistant Director or Director, Sport VP, VP of Season (i.e. Spring/Summer or Fall/Winter).

If resolution is still not achieved, a written grievance may be submitted within seven (7) days to the P.L.A.Y. Executive Board President for review by the Executive Evaluation and Enforcement Committee (E.E.E.). The E.E.E. decision is final. Submitting such a request should be considered a last resort and doing so acknowledges that all parties agree to abide by the provided resolution.

Penalties

Failure to abide by this process for dispute resolution, including the 24-hour rule, will result in the following penalties:

- 1st offense – Written Warning
- 2nd offense – Removal of the parent and player (or coach or board member) from all P.L.A.Y. activities for a period of two (2) weeks.
- 3rd offense – Removal of the parent and player (or coach or board member) from all P.L.A.Y. activities for a period of one (1) year. Permanent suspension of athlete/coach privileges is possible and will also be considered.

Notification of disciplinary action involving a youth or adult may be shared with league governing bodies, appropriate P.L.A.Y. sport leadership, affiliated organizational leaders, and/or local law enforcement as necessary.

Significant Escalations

If a participant is involved in a physical altercation with another participant, parent, coach, board member, or a board member's family members, a thorough investigation will be conducted. Upon review, penalties/suspensions may be assessed, up to and including, removal from all P.L.A.Y. activities for an indefinite period of time.

Behavior and Consequences

HIGH IMPACT INCIDENT	
BEHAVIOR(S)	
<p>IF A PLAYER... Shows physical contact or aggression towards any coach, player, official or spectator. This includes fighting, threats of physical abuse/contact or display of any weapon (including equipment used as a weapon).</p>	
CONSEQUENCES	
All Offenses	<p>The player is immediately removed from the game and will not be allowed to re-enter. Player is expected to remain in uniform and on the bench for the remainder of the game (unless the player continues to be disruptive, in which case the player should be escorted out of the facility). Any violation in this category that threatens the immediate safety of players, coaches, officials or spectators should immediately be reported to local law enforcement authorities.</p>

MEDIUM IMPACT INCIDENT	
BEHAVIOR(S)	
<p>IF A PLAYER... Verbally disrespects a coach, player, umpire, league/tournament official or spectator. This includes verbal threats, verbal abuse, or intimidation towards an official, teammate, coach or fan</p>	
<p>IF A PLAYER... Uses inappropriate (swearing) or abusive language on the field or in dugout. This includes inappropriate gestures (e.g. "flipping the bird").</p>	
CONSEQUENCES	
1st Offense	<p>If on offense, player sits out next immediate defensive inning. (If player is already scheduled to be on bench, player must sit-out the following inning.)</p> <p>If on defense, player is removed from the game. (Player may return next defensive inning.)</p>
Additional Offenses	<p>Player is removed from the game and will not be allowed to re-enter. Player is expected to remain in uniform and on the bench for the remainder of the game.</p>

LOW IMPACT INCIDENT

BEHAVIOR(S)

IF A PLAYER... Throws or slams any equipment out of frustration or disrespect. This includes, but is not limited to, a bat, glove, hat, batting glove or similar

IF A PLAYER... Behavior that negatively impacts the team including, but not limited to, temper tantrums, refusal to participate, leaving a game early, teasing, gossip, bullying, name-calling, etc. Defies a coaching directive (e.g., no bottle-flipping in the dugout, no eating seeds in the field, etc.).

IF A PLAYER... Demonstrates property misuse or damage to baseball equipment, playing field or surrounding ballpark before, during or after a game.

CONSEQUENCES

1st Offense	Player is given verbal warning by a coach. (If delivered by asst. coach, head coach must be informed.)
2nd Offense	Player sits out next immediate defensive inning. (If player is already scheduled to be on bench, player must sit-out the following inning.)
3rd or more	Player is removed from the game and will not be allowed to re-enter. Player is expected to remain in uniform and on the bench for the remainder of the game.

BEHAVIOR AND CONSEQUENCE PROCESS FOR COACHES

YELLOW OFFENSES	No further documentation is required.
ORANGE OFFENSES	The Grade Level Manager and the Director must be informed via email of the disciplinary action taken.
RED OFFENSES	The Director and VP must be notified by the head coach via email immediately (24-Hour Rule Exempt). There will be an investigation conducted by members of the Board. There will be a meeting with the player, parents and/or the entire team as required to document and outline further disciplinary action (which may include additional time on the bench, suspension from baseball activities and/or a request to the P.L.A.Y. Executive Board for removal of the player(s) from the program). Any further behavior expectations must be approved and delivered to the player and family by the Board.

NOTES

Any behavior detrimental to the team or P.L.A.Y. not specifically covered by this document may be subject to disciplinary action as outlined in the P.L.A.Y. Code of Conduct signed by all players as part of the baseball registration process.

Each category of behavior expectations above is its own progression. However, if a player has a 2nd offense in two or more categories, they will be combined for the purposes of further disciplinary action.

Should two or more inappropriate behavior events occur simultaneously all warning(s), corrective action(s) and/or disciplinary action(s) will be documented and enforced as if a single inappropriate behavior event occurred.

In the event that two or more inappropriate behavior events occur in a series of events before the first inappropriate behavior event was addressed (See Example #2 below), all warning(s), corrective action(s) and/or disciplinary action(s) will be documented and enforced as if a single inappropriate behavior event occurred.

Example #1: Player uses inappropriate or abusive language while throwing his/her bat in the dugout.

Example #2: Player get thrown out at which time player uses inappropriate or abusive language, as player is walking back to dugout player takes batting helmet off and throws it into the dugout while using inappropriate or abusive language.

If a player/coach/spectator is ejected by the umpire, for any reason, this will rise to the MBL Disciplinary policies and actions. It is PLAY policy that any suspensions handed down by the MBL (to a player, coach or spectator), PLAY will also add a matching suspension in addition to MBL's decision.

Example – A player/coach/parent is ejected and MBL issues a one game suspension, PLAY will add on an additional game for a total of 2 games.

This behavior and consequence chart is player focused. The behaviors within, in addition to the codes of conduct, fully apply to coaches and spectators as well. However, the consequences will be handled directly by the Travel Baseball Board and there are few or no warnings/'second chances' for violation by the adults.

Commitment/Conduct Agreement

2026 P.L.A.Y. Travel Baseball Commitment / Conduct Agreement

April 13th – July 25th or when the season is determined to be over for a team.

This form must be signed prior to 2026 Travel Baseball Tryouts, and any questions may be directed to the Prior Lake Travel Baseball Director.

Membership on a Prior Lake Travel Baseball team requires a high level of commitment from both players and families. Travel Baseball is an earned opportunity, and consistent participation is essential to team development, preparation, and competitive balance. Families who anticipate missing two or more league or tournament games for non-injury reasons should carefully consider whether Travel Baseball is the appropriate commitment for the season.

The official season dates align with those published by the MBL. Open and timely communication with the head coach is critical, particularly during April when pre-season practices and outside tournament opportunities may overlap.

April pre-season practices are designed to build team chemistry and prepare athletes for competition. While some pre-season practices may be designated as optional, most are mandatory. As a general guideline, weekday April practices are mandatory. Weekend practices may be designated by the head coach as mandatory or optional based on scheduling considerations. "Optional" does not mean canceled. It means players who are unable to attend will not be subject to the Commitment Policy. Mandatory practices fall under the Commitment Policy and attendance expectations apply. Coaches must make decisions based on what is best for the entire team, not individual scheduling conflicts.

Once P.L.A.Y. league games begin in late April, the Commitment Policy & Codes of Conduct apply fully and consistently to all practices and games, regardless of outside activities. Failure to meet commitment expectations may result in disciplinary action, including reduced playing time, suspension, ineligibility for future seasons, or removal from the current team as outlined below. No refunds will be issued.

- If a player misses **practice** but is not injured or sick. This **must be** communicated in advance to the head coach (HC):
 - 1st offense – Coaches may use their discretion to not penalize a player if there is no past history of absences and the reason for missing the practice is **valid**, otherwise 2nd offense consequences apply
 - 2nd offense – Bat last next game
 - 3rd offense – Bat last next game and 2 less defensive innings than all other players
 - 4th offense – Sit out 1 full game for each offense (dressed in uniform sitting on the bench, warm-up with the team, participate positively with the team by warming up pitchers, retrieving foul balls, etc.)
 - 5+ offenses – May lose eligibility to participate in the program next year (15U – current season)

- If a player misses a **regular season game** but is not injured or sick. This **must be** communicated in advance to the HC:
 - 1st offense – Coaches may use their discretion to not penalize a player if there is no past history of absences and the reason for missing the game is **valid**, otherwise 2nd offense consequences apply;
 - 2nd offense – Bat last next game and 2 less defensive innings than all other players
 - 3rd offense – Sit out 1 full game for each offense (dressed in uniform sitting on the bench, warm-up with the team, participate positively with the team by warming up pitchers, retrieving foul balls, etc.)
 - 4+ offenses – May lose eligibility to participate in the program next year

- If a player misses a **tournament game** (each tournament game missed is one offense, not considered one absence for the weekend) but is not injured or sick. This **must be** communicated in advance to the HC:
