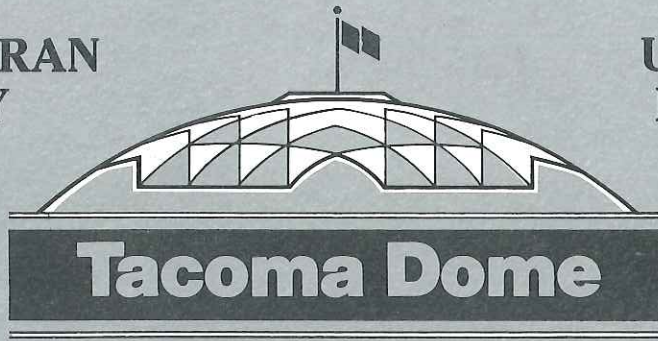
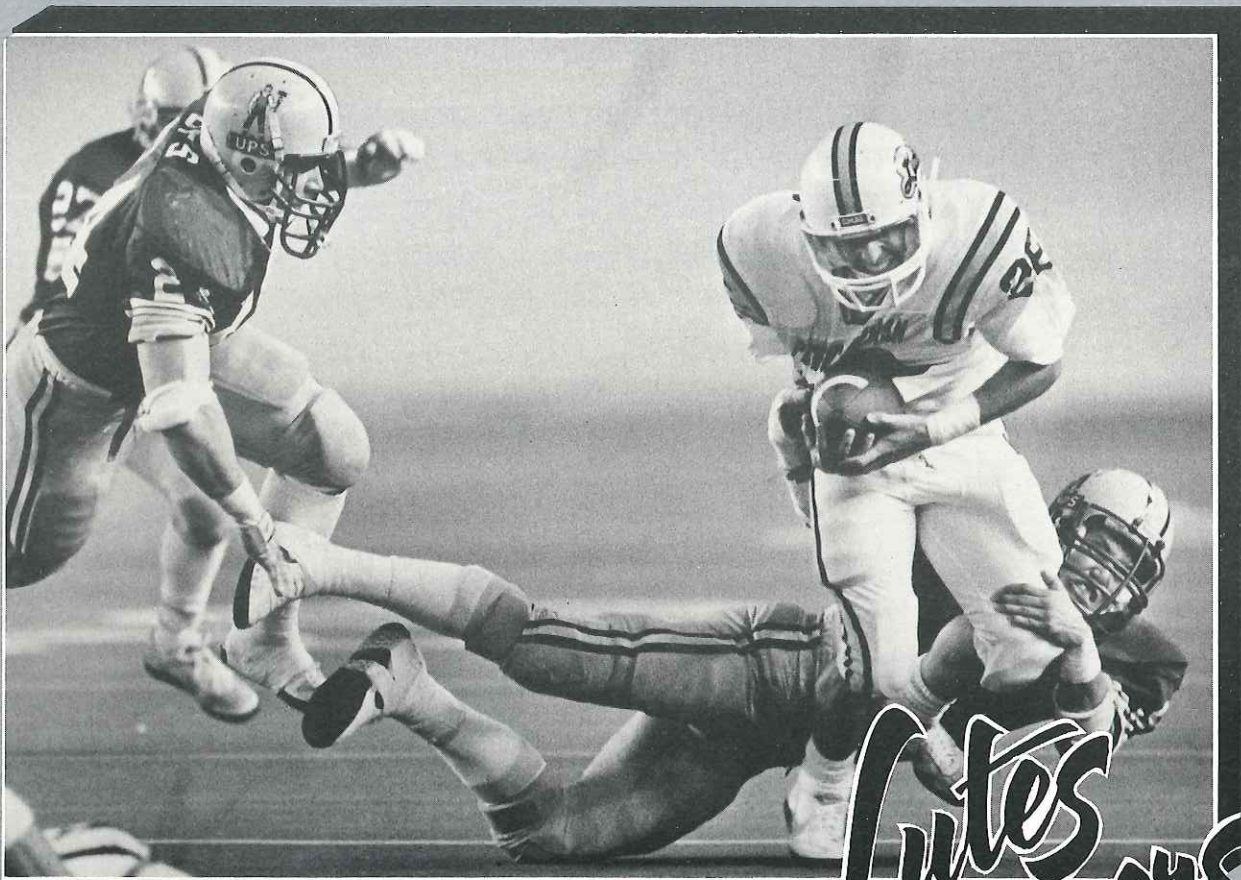

Loggers Enjoy a 42-13-5 Lead

- 1931** UPS 20, PLU 0 Chet Baker's 60-yard punts held the Lutes at bay.
- 1932** UPS 25, PLU 0 Jimmy Ennis ran wild for the Loggers at Stadium Bowl.
- 1938** UPS 6, PLU 0 A 55-yard Bill Madden-to-Richie Rowe pass set up the TD.
- 1941** PLU 47, UPS 0 Marv Harshman scored twice; Marv Tommervik rushed for 93 yards.
- 1942** UPS 14, PLU 6 Darrell Swen scored on a 70-yard interception return for UPS.
- 1946** PLU 13, UPS 7 Fullback Norm Sturm bulled for both Lute touchdowns.
- 1947** PLU 19, UPS 0 The first Totem Bowl game attracted 13,000 fans.
- 1948** UPS 6 PLU 6 John Heinrich made his UPS coaching debut at Lincoln Bowl.
UPS 13, PLU 7 Mel Light's pass to Len Kalapus provided the winning TD.
- 1949** UPS 27, PLU 0 Mel Light scored twice, including a 54-yard dash.
UPS 20, PLU 0 Dale Larson rushed for 101 yards to spark the Loggers.
- 1950** UPS 35, PLU 0 Art Viafore passed for three TDs and set up a fourth.
PLU 13, UPS 13 UPS halfback Don Murdock scored twice at Bellarmine Field.
- 1951** UPS 20, PLU 0 Once again, Art Viafore took charge: two TD passes.
UPS 26, PLU 0 Wally Erwin scored on a 70 yard kickoff return.
- 1952** UPS 7, PLU 0 QB Art Viafore connected with Joe Retallick for the lone TD.
PLU 7, UPS 0 Glen Huffman plunged one-yard to score; PLU won the EVCO title.
- 1953** UPS 20, PLU 0 Dale Meshke, Walt Tostedt, and Walt Espeland reached paydirt.
UPS 27, PLU 6 Sandy deCarteret tallied twice on short yardage plays.
- 1954** UPS 7, PLU 6 Wally Erwin's 80-yard kickoff return sparked UPS' comeback.
UPS 13, PLU 7 Joe Stortini threw a 41-yard pass to set up UPS' final TD.
- 1955** UPS 14, PLU 12 Logger Don Parson's two PATs were the difference.
PLU 19, UPS 0 The Tom Gilmer-to-Ron Storaasli passing combo ignited the Lutes.
- 1956** UPS 19, PLU 19 Tom Gilmer hit Ron Storaasli on a 63-yard strike with 1:15 to go.
UPS 20, PLU 0 Larry Kelly's 76-yard punt return gave UPS a lift.
- 1957** PLU 7 UPS 6 Tom Gilmer's PAT dropkick followed John Jacobson's TD run.
UPS 14, PLU 0 Logger freshman Dick Pruett rushed for 107 yards.
- 1958** UPS 9, PLU 6 Bob Austin scored on a 67-yard run; UPS added a safety.
UPS 6, PLU 0 A one-yard sneak by QB Jerry Thacker was all UPS needed.
- 1959** UPS 7, PLU 6 Fuzz Elliott, former PLU star, kicked the winning PAT.
UPS 28, PLU 7 The Loggers scored three times in the second half.
- 1960** UPS 21, PLU 14 Two Jerry Thacker-to-Ed Tingstad TD passes aided UPS.
PLU 13, UPS 0 Keith Shahan and Doug McClary were Lute sparkplugs.
- 1961** PLU 13, UPS 13 PLU scored first and last, but missed the final PAT attempt.
UPS 21, PLU 7 Jerry Hoxsey scored two TDs and passed for a third.
- 1962** UPS 10, PLU 7 Jim Mancuso kicked a 33-yard field goal for the Loggers.
UPS 0, PLU 0 The tie cost UPS a share of the EVCO title.
- 1963** UPS 16, PLU 0 Dick Dornfield passed 86 yards to Les Ross to open scoring.
UPS 9, PLU 7 A Steve Maddocks-to Joe Peyton 12-yard TD pass lifted UPS.

- PLU 14, UPS 0 QB Tony Lister sparkled as PLU won its third straight game.
- 1966 UPS 17, PLU 7 A Pat Larkin TD catch and a Clint Scott field goal helped UPS.
- 1967 UPS 37, PLU 0 Al Roberts tallied twice in the series' most lopsided game.
- 1968 UPS 21, PLU 6 Jerome Crawford's 59-yard punt return put UPS ahead to stay.

- 1972 UPS 37, PLU 19 Scott Hanson rushed for 111 yards to lead the Loggers.
- 1973 UPS 30, PLU 21 Mike Mickas threw two TD passes in UPS' 8th straight win.
- 1974 PLU 38, UPS 27 PLU's Rick Finseth tossed three TD passes, two to Mark Clinton.
- 1975 UPS 20, PLU 7 UPS' Brent Heath scored on a 33-yard interception return.
- 1976 UPS 40, PLU 21 Loggers scored on the game's third play and coasted.
- 1977 UPS 23, PLU 21 UPS defenders sparkled in the Kingdome before 13,167 fans.
- 1978 UPS 27, PLU 14 UPS' Steve Levenseller scored on a 98-yard kickoff return.
- 1979 UPS 29, PLU 14 Logger QB Ivy Iverson passed for 212 yards.
- 1983 PLU 13, UPS 10 Jeff Rohr rushed for 177 yards and kicked two field goals.

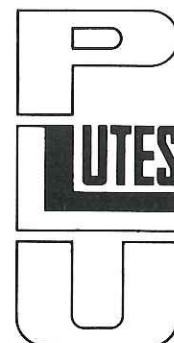

ROSS HJELSETH UPS Head Coach



The 1986 season will be the second for Coach Ross Hjelseth. After the success of Coach Hjelseth's rookie season, Logger fans have reason to look forward to the upcoming year. The Loggers finished 7-2 in their first season under Coach Hjelseth and placed second in the Northern division of the Columbia Football League. In addition, the Logger football program finished ranked 15th in the NAIA National Poll. Coach Hjelseth has worked hard towards the ideal of "Commitment to Excellence With Class," within the football program and is ardent in his beliefs about the value of education.

Hjelseth, 35, came to UPS from North Dakota State University where he was the head assistant football coach for four years. During the time Hjelseth was at NDSU, the Bison went 45-7 and captured the NCAA Division II National Championship in 1983. Hjelseth was the chief recruiter for NDSU and coached the Bison offensive backs and receivers. The NDSU offense was ranked No. 1 nationally in the NCAA Division II during the 1984 season. Hjelseth graduated from Mayville State (N.D.) in 1973 with degrees in Business Education and Physical Education. Ross and wife, Ronni, have one son, Brandon, 1 year old.

FROSTY WESTERING PLU Head Coach



Frosty Westering, who has guided Lute gridders to NAIA Division II playoff appearances in five of the past seven years, begins his 15th season at the Pacific Lutheran helm as the school's all-time winningest coach with 108 career victories. His 152 career collegiate victories makes him the winningest active coach in NAIA Division II.

Westering, 58, came to PLU in 1972 after successful coaching stops at Parsons College (Iowa) and Lea College (Minnesota). Since his arrival at PLU, no Lute team has lost more than four games in a season. PLU has played for the NAIA Division II national title three times during Westering's tenure—in 1980, 1983, and 1985—winning the title in 1980. His overall coaching record at PLU is 108-31-1, a .775 winning percentage.

Winning, however, is a by-product of Westering's overall coaching philosophy. His PHD (Pride, Hustle, Desire) style of football emphasizes a double-win theme: victory on the scoreboard and the satisfaction of playing to one's personal potential.

A full professor of Physical Education, specializing in motivation and psychology, Westering is a dynamic speaker and is in high demand at local, regional and national gatherings. He is also a very active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

PUGET SOUND FOOTBALL... A Dual Commitment



The student-athlete at Puget Sound becomes an all-around winner as the outstanding academic opportunities are coupled with opportunities for athletic excellence. A total of 21 intercollegiate sports are offered for the student-athlete. The success of Puget Sound athletes on and off the field was very evident during the 1985-86 seasons. Among the almost 400 participants in Logger athletics, 29 were chosen All-America, 4 were selected Academic All-America, over 30 were picked for All-League or All-District recognition, 16 earned Scholar-Athlete designation and 5 were selected as members of the first class of Phi Beta Kappa at the University of Puget Sound.

This commitment to scholarship is the foundation on which the Logger Football Program is built. Coach Ross Hjelseth and his staff are dedicated to the idea of building quality young men who will find success in all facets of life through football. The emphasis in the term student-athlete is properly placed first on the word student in the UPS football program. For example, the 1985 Logger team boasted Academic All-American David Hombach. This 6'3" senior offensive lineman was a Logger team captain, a Columbia Football All-League pick and most importantly a 3.82 student in economics and finance. "This honor is probably more impressive than any other All-America

team because this means David Hombach is an All-American in the classroom. Young people being successful in all aspects of their lives is the ultimate of what college athletics is all about," noted Coach Hjelseth.

The University of Puget Sound approach has been successful in guiding the lives of many student-athletes. Brian Threlkeld was among the graduates of Puget Sound in 1983 and a four-year offensive tackle and center on the football team. He was an Academic All-American, a U.S.F.L. draft selection in 1983, an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship award winner, and a U.P.S. Laura H. Cunningham Fellow. Presently he is a graduate student in the Department of History, the University of Chicago. These are his reflections on Logger Football:

"At Puget Sound, commitment to excellence on the football field did not preclude commitment to excellence in the classroom; indeed, the pursuit of excellence in one endeavor complemented the pursuit of excellence in the other. The coaching staff recognized that academics came first, and gladly accommodated me when conflicts arose. Logger Football gave me memories and friends that I treasure, and enhanced an education of which I am proud."

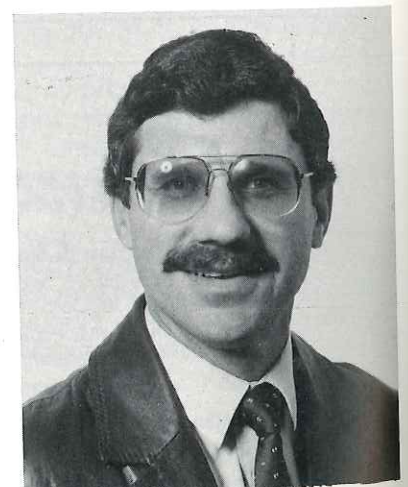
LOGGER STATS & FACTS: The return of 16 starters and the success of 1985 will serve as the foundation for Logger Football in 1986. . . COACH ROSS HJELSETH, who fashioned a 7-2 ledger in his first season in 1985, added 40 freshmen to the Logger squad this season. . . The Logger's veer offense is back along with top performers JACK JONES, an All-CFL receiver who caught 18 passes for 253 yards last year, MIKE OLIPHANT, an NAIA All-America pick and UPS's first 1,000 yard rusher, as well as linemen DAVE HYYTINEN, a 2nd team All-CFL selection. On defense, the hard-hitting RICK SASSARA returns as inside linebacker after collecting 65 tackles and 45 assists a year ago. Big hits are also expected from defensive back JOE LOGAN and linebacker DON HOFFMAN. The UPS kicking game will benefit from the return of 1985 starters JIM BECKMAN and GRANT ALLEN.

DR. RICHARD ULRICH

Director of Physical Education, Athletics and Recreation

Dr. Richard Ulrich is beginning his third year as the Director of Physical Education, Athletics and Recreation at the University of Puget Sound. His spirit and enthusiasm have been major factors in the resurgence of pride in Logger athletics.

Dr. Ulrich joined the university in 1984 after a successful stint at Adams State College, Alamosa, Colorado. In addition to his duties of Physical Education and Athletic Director at Adams State, Ulrich was the head wrestling coach for 10 years and served as defensive coordinator in football. As the Adams State wrestling mentor he coached three National Championship teams, three runnerup teams, and 20 individual champions. In 1980 he was named the NAIA National Wrestling Coach of the Year. Dr. Ulrich received his master's degree from the University of Arizona and his Ph.D. from the University of Utah.

Senior, 6-2, 225 lbs., Seattle, Washington

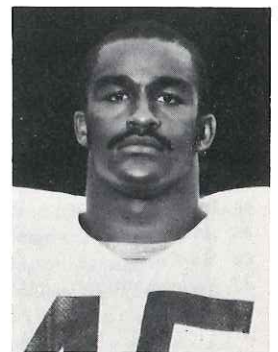

A full professor, Olson specializes in administration and curriculum development.

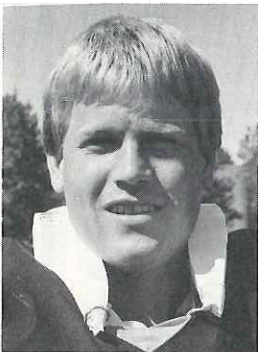
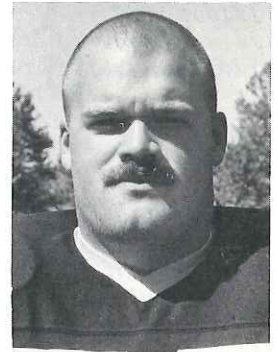

AT PLU, DIAMONDS ARE FOREVER

Sixty years ago, in 1926, Pacific Lutheran dropped a 12-0 decision to Puget Sound in what is now recognized as PLU's first-ever football game. Ironically, four hundred eighty-four games, 34 winning seasons, and eight coaches later, the Lutes will officially kick off their diamond anniversary season tonight against Puget Sound.

From a historical perspective, that first game with UPS in 1926 is perhaps PLU's most important. It marked the birth of Lute football and a tradition of excellence that lives today. As PLU's 60th edition Lutes embark on their diamond anniversary season, take a look back at some memorable moments from Lute years of the past.

- 1926 PLU's first football game, a 12-0 loss to Puget Sound.
- 1927 PLU's first football win, 14-0 over St. Leo's. Also the Lutes' first winning season (4-1-2).
- 1936 PLU's first unbeaten season. Coach Cliff Olson's squad went 5-0-2 and outscored its opponent 90-6.
- 1939 PLU beat Linfield 27-13, the first of a still school-record 18 consecutive victories.
- 1940 Cliff Olson's Lutes down national powerhouse Gonzaga, 16-13, before a crowd of more than 15,000 in Tacoma Stadium. Marv Harshman's 32-yard field goal in the closing seconds was the game-winner.
- 1947 Coach Marv Tommervik's team downs Southern Oregon 27-21 to complete an unbeaten 7-0-2 season. The game was also PLU's first bowl game, The Pear Bowl.
- 1952 Defensive back Ron Billings becomes PLU's first NAIA All-American.
- 1953 PLU records its 100th win, a 19-6 victory over University of British Columbia.

- 1961 PLU suffers its worst defeat in history, 67-0 to Whitworth.
- 1962 Marv Tommervik, Lute halfback from 1939-41 and head coach from 1947-50, is inducted into the NAIA Football Hall of Fame.
- 1966 Vic Eaton catches a school-record 12 passes against Willamette.
- 1970 Coach Roy Carlson leads PLU past Whitworth 47-0 as the Lutes record their 150th win.
- 1974 Mark Clinton gains a school-record 199 yards receiving against College of Idaho.
- 1977 Coach Frosty Westering leads PLU past Eastern Washington 22-6 in the Lutes' 200th football win.
- 1979 PLU's first NAIA national playoff appearance, beating California Lutheran 34-14 in the quarterfinals, but losing to Findlay 9-0 in the semifinals.
- 1980 Frosty Westering wins his 65th game at PLU, making him the all-time winningest Lute football coach. PLU downs Wilmington 38-10 for its first NAIA national championship.
- 1983 Fullback Jeff Rohr rushes for a school-record 1,226 yards, making him the all-time leading rusher in Lute history.
- 1985 PLU advances to the NAIA national playoffs for the fifth time in seven years. A 24-7 loss to Wisconsin-LaCrosse in the national title prevented PLU's first unbeaten season in 38 years. Lute Coach Frosty Westering records his 100th PLU victory, a 19-6 win over Linfield.
- 1986 PLU football celebrates its 60th anniversary.



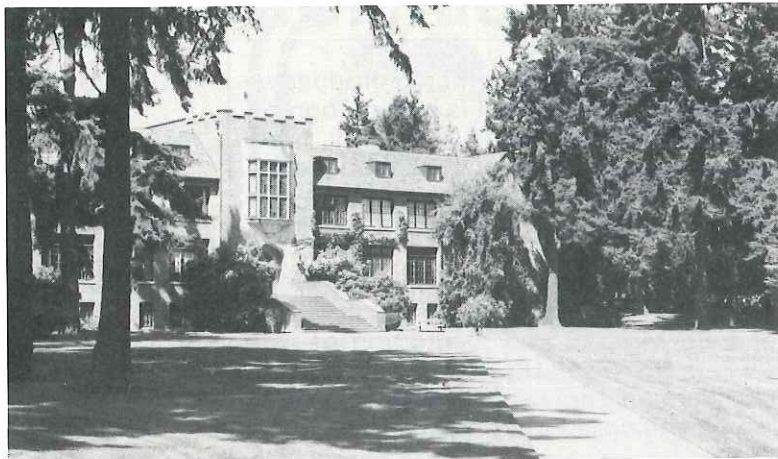

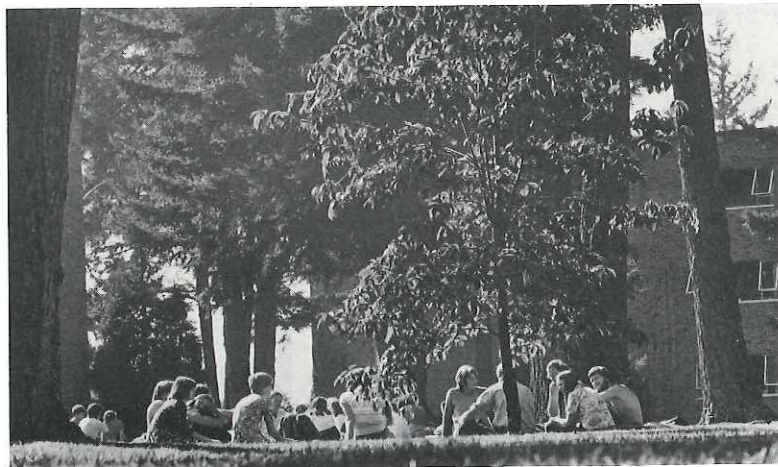

An educational arm of the North Pacific District, American Lutheran Church, PLU also has board representation from the Pacific Northwest Synod, Lutheran Church in America.

PLU was, in fact, PLA when it opened its doors in 1894. The institution became a junior college in 1921, three-year normal school in 1931, college of education in 1939, college of liberal arts in 1941, and university in 1960.

The University is comprised of eight major academic units, including three divisions in its college of arts and sciences (humanities, natural sciences, and social sciences). The five professional schools are the arts, business administration, education, nursing and physical education. Master's degree programs are offered in business administration, education, music, public administration, social sciences, computer science, and computer applications. A faculty of 240 serves 3,700 students.
