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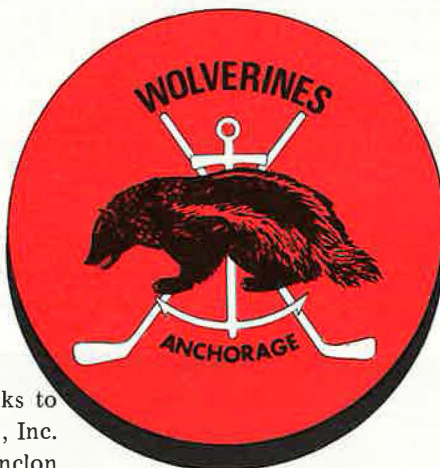

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# **ANCHORAGE HOCKEY ASSOCIATION**

## Past - Present - Future

1970 – A program for Mighty Mites was begun. (5 - 7 year olds)

1971 – Faced with a curtailment of organized youth hockey in Anchorage due to the sale of the Sports Arena, AHA accepted full responsibility for the management of the facility through November 1974, under a lease agreement.

1972 – Alaska State Hockey Association was formed to promote hockey throughout the state. A summer hockey school was conducted for 200 skaters.

1973 – "The Wolverines", the first professionally organized hockey team, coached by Milan Marcetta, operated under the direction of AHA. The local talent did well against top flight Canadian and Japanese teams. AHA Youth Hockey Membership was near the 750 enrollment mark. Community excitement was reflected in the rapid expansion of programs in adult supervision, refereeing, equipment development, and most importantly the growth of the finest lists of sponsors and donors in the history of Anchorage.

1974 – AHA registered more than 900 players and was showing all the signs of passing quickly from infancy to a full grown hockey association. Facilities had to be improved, systems enlarged, scheduling computerized, bylaws changed, and many other facets of the operation were feeling the immense pressure of the association's rapid growth. The AHA received word that the existing Sports Arena would be deactivated at the expiration of the present lease in 1977. The existing facility could not accommodate the present needs of the hockey program, the Anchorage Figure Skating Association, and the other community needs that this one of a kind building was called upon to fulfill.

1975 - 1976 –

Season The progressive planning of Mayor George Sullivan and his hard working Parks and Recreation Department succeeded, with community support, in arranging construction of a new arena for public use at Mulcahy Park. This new facility should provide many years of high quality indoor ice for Anchorage youth.

Due to the coming closing of the existing Sports Arena in 1977, the people of Anchorage again face the problem of fulfilling the needs of our ever-growing youth programs. A larger arena must be in our immediate planning to replace the existing one by 1977.

The AHA Board has before it a proposed building with a very special cost. It should seat in excess of 8,500 spectators or more than 3 times the capacity of the existing arena. It will have up to 20,000 square feet of office space and concession areas. Along with its capacity to handle the increased needs of the AHA, it also will provide the first building of its type where major road shows, conventions, and other large gatherings can be held. The additional income generated from this type of arena can provide a fantastic return for our AHA youth activities, our travel-orientated businesses and a broader base of tax for Anchorage.

The coming year should be the greatest yet in the history of the AHA. Our list of hard working, very appreciated members, sponsors, donors, and other people that work for and care about the youth of today, is still growing. Our heartfelt thanks to them all.

# YOUTH HOCKEY PROGRAM

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— 1973 —

“The Wolverines”, the first professionally organized hockey team, coached by Milan Marcetta, operated under the direction of AHA.  
The local talent did well against top flight Canadian and Japanese teams.

The highlights of AHA’s administration of organized hockey were the result of the combined efforts of more than 500 volunteers. These supporters refereed, begged financial support and gave of their own time and money to see that the area youngsters got on the ice properly instructed, supervised and equipped. The program has historically run at a deficit, and just as traditionally, it has borrowed money (and paid it back), solicited memberships and team sponsorships, organized parent projects and accepted generous donations from business and individual donors to maintain a solvent financial status.

The future of AHA depends to a great deal on this continued support. An estimated 900 players will register for this season’s hockey. They will play on one of 60+ league teams scheduled from November through April. Sixty teams will compete against each other twice each week for a total of over 1,000 games during the 30-week season. Since each game requires one and one-half hours to play, we would estimate that 2,250 hours would be devoted to competitive hockey this season. Every hour of game time has a participation, or use hour factor, of 55 people (35 players, coaches and officials, and 20 spectators on the average). The program, then, has the potential to involve approximately 124,000 player-spectator use hour contacts involving perhaps a hard core of 2,000 individuals — players, parents and spectators — on a recurring basis.

The winter sports program in Anchorage has long since outgrown the existing Sports Arena, which will be deactivated at the expiration of the present lease in 1977. The present facility cannot accommodate the present requirements of the hockey program, the Anchorage Figure Skating Association and the Curling Club.

The AHA has acquired land and is proceeding with financing to construct a facility that will accommodate the collective needs of winter sports in the community.

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


















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# HOCKEY TERMS

	<b>Fore Check</b> To keep opponents in their end of the rink while trying to regain control of the puck.	<b>Face-off</b> To start play at any time, the puck is dropped between two opposing players who face each other. Time starts when the puck is dropped.	
<b>Forehand</b>	<b>Freezing the Puck</b> Holding the puck against the boards with the stick or skates.	<b>Power Play</b> The name applied to a group of players when a team has the advantage of an extra man because of a penalty to the other club; usually four forwards and one defenseman.	<b>Face-off</b>
	<b>Hat Trick</b> Three goals scored by a player in one game.	<b>Point</b> A position on the ice just inside the opposition blue line and close to the boards on either side of the rink. The attacking defensemen usually take these positions when their team is in control of the puck in the opposition's zone.

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## "WHEN THE WHISTLE BLOWS"



**SLASHING** — A series of chopping motions with the edge of one hand across the opposite forearm.



**CHARGING** — Rotating clenched fists around one another in front of the body.



**DELAYED PENALTY** — Referee points several times to penalized player and then uses "slow whistle"



**ICING** — Arms crossed over chest.



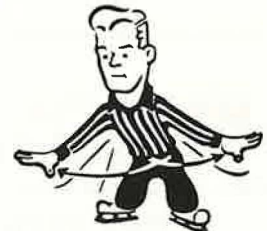
**CROSS-CHECKING** — A series of forward and backward motions with both fists clenched extending from the chest.



**MISCONDUCT** — Placing both hands on the hips several times and then pointing to the penalized player.



**ELBOWING** — Tapping either elbow with the other hand.



**WASH-OUT** — Both arms swung laterally across the body with the palms down; when used by referee it indicates goal disallowed; when used by linesmen it indicates no icing or off-side.



**INTERFERENCE** — Arms extended and crossed in front of the body.



**HOLDING** — Clasping either wrist with the other hand well in front of the chest.



**HIGH STICKING** — Holding both fists, clenched, one above the other at the height of the forehead.



**TRIPPING** — Extending the right leg forward, clear of the ice, and striking it with the right hand below the knee.



**SLOW WHISTLE** — Arm extended above the head, to be used for an icing infraction, delayed offside, or delayed penalty.

**HOOING** — A series of tugging motions with both arms, as if pulling something towards the body.

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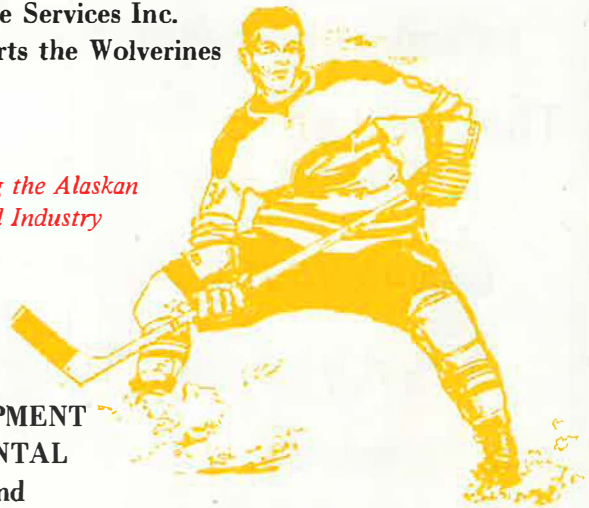
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## GAME OFFICIALS



Once upon a time, a hockey game was run by two referees working together. They were their own linemen. Now there is one referee and two linemen.

The referee controls the game. He calls all the penalties and must decide the legality of goals, though sometimes he will call time and ask his linemen for an opinion before he makes a final decision.

The duty of the linemen is to determine offsides and icings. They drop the puck for faceoffs in the neutral zone. They chase pucks after stoppage of play. And it is their unenviable job to break up fights while the referee assesses the penalties.

## STOP

Please do not throw anything, repeat, anything on the ice before, during or after the game. Objects on the ice can and have caused serious and in many cases permanent injuries to players. Only two inches of his skates actually grip the ice and any foreign object on the surface that comes in contact with a player's skates can very easily throw him into the sideboards and cause injury. If you want to throw something, make it your voice.

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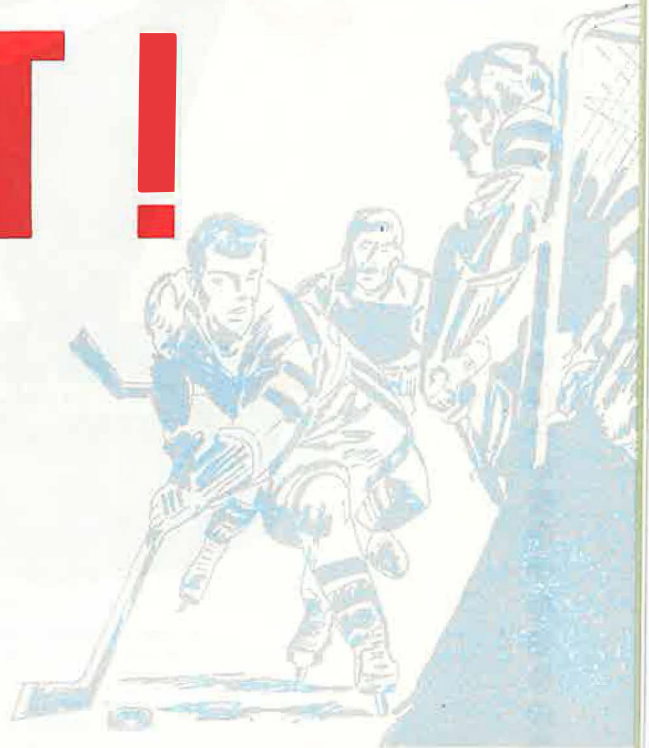

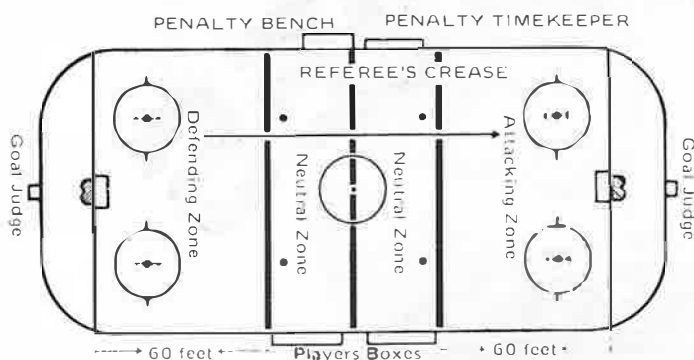

# HOW TO ENJOY HOCKEY

**HOCKEY IS NOT** only the fastest sport in the world but it is also one of the easiest to understand. Learn these simple fundamental rules about hockey and you will not only enjoy it more but you will soon be a hockey expert.

## THE RINK



A regulation hockey rink is rectangular in shape, with rounded corners. It measures 200 feet long by 85 feet wide and has a hoard fence (generally called the boards or dasher) three and a half to four feet high enclosing the playing surface. Herculite glass panels extend above the hoards for the protection of spectators and to keep the puck from constantly going out of play.

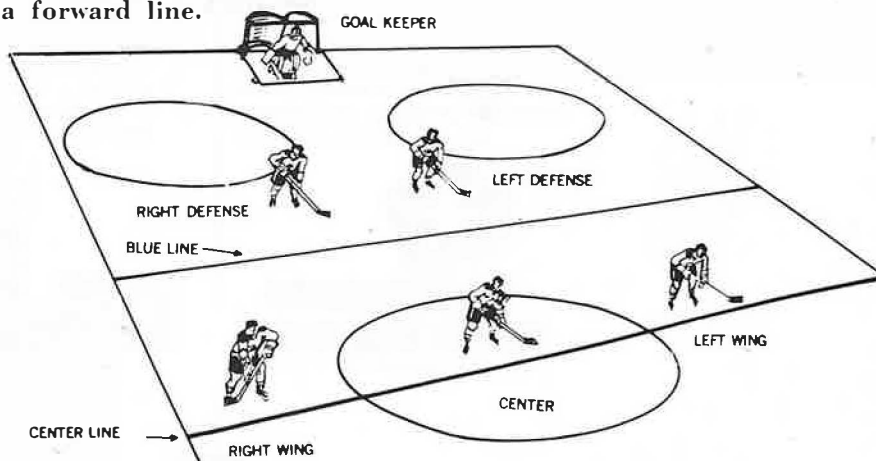
## THE HOCKEY TEAM

A hockey team consists of six players: Goalkeeper, right defense, left defense, right wing, center, and left wing.

The center and the two wingers are called forwards. As a unit, they are called a forward line. There are usually three set forward lines, which alternate on a regular basis throughout the game. Two other forwards act as alternates and penalty-killers.

The left defense and right defense are called defensemen. A team invariably carries five defensemen.

The goalie usually plays the entire 60 minutes. However, each team is required to carry two goalies at all times. The second one must be fully dressed on the player bench, ready to play whenever required.



## MOST FREQUENT PENALTIES

**MINOR PENALTY:** Two minutes in penalty box. No substitute allowed. If opponents score on penalized player's team while he is off, he returns immediately to the ice. If a player from each team is sent off simultaneously, they serve the full two minutes even if a goal is scored.

**MAJOR PENALTY:** Five minutes in penalty box. No substitute allowed and player remains in penalty box full five minutes even if a goal is scored against his team. If a player from each team is sent off with majors simultaneously, both teams remain at full strength.

**MISCONDUCT PENALTY:** Ten minutes in penalty box. As this is a personal penalty, the penalized player's team does not play a man short. Automatic \$50 fine.

**GAME MISCONDUCT:** Suspension for balance of game. Again, this is a personal penalty and the team does not play below normal strength. Automatic \$50 fine and case reported to NHL President for possible further action.

**MATCH PENALTY:** Suspension for balance of game. Team plays one man short for either 5 minutes or 10 minutes, depending on severity of violation. Player automatically fined \$100 and case reported to NHL President for possible further action.

## GLOSSARY OF HOCKEY TERMS

**BACK CHECK:** Attempt by forwards on way back to their defensive zone to regain puck from opposition.

**BODY CHECK:** Slowing or stopping opponent with the puck by using hip or shoulders.

**BREAKAWAY:** No opponent between puck carrier and opponent's goal except goalkeeper.

**DROP PASS:** Puck carrier leaves the puck behind to be picked up by a trailing teammate.

**FORE CHECK:** To keep opponents in their end of the rink while trying to regain control of the puck.

**FREEZING THE PUCK:** Holding the puck against the boards with the stick or skates.

**HAT TRICK:** Three goals scored by a player in one game.

**HEADMAN THE PUCK:** Passing the puck ahead to a leading teammate.

**POWER PLAY:** When a team has a manpower advantage, it tries to keep opponents penned in by moving five attackers inside the penalized team's defensive zone and controlling puck.

**SLAP SHOT:** Bringing the stick back, then quickly forward and slapping the puck ahead.

**SPLITTING THE DEFENSE:** Puck carrier goes between the two opposing defensemen.

**WRIST SHOT:** Propelling the puck off the blade of the stick with a flicking motion of the wrist.

# HOCKEY'S THREE MAIN RULES

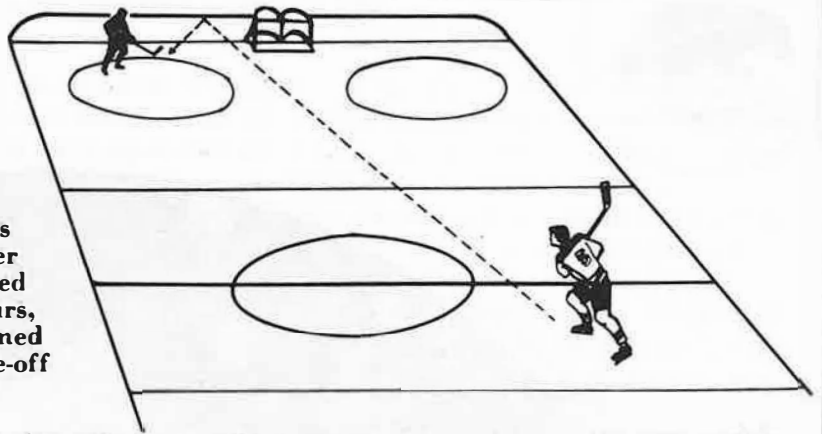
Learn these rules and you will know the cardinal principles of hockey

## 1 ICING THE PUCK

Icing the puck is *not* permitted when the teams are at *equal numerical strength*. Thus it is an infraction when a player on his team's side of the red center line shoots the puck all the way down the ice, it crosses the red goal line at any point other than the goal itself and is first touched by a defending player. When this occurs, play is stopped and the puck is returned to the other end of the ice for a face-off in the offending team's zone.

Icing the puck is *not* called if:

- a) the goalie plays the puck by leaving his net;
- b) if puck cuts across part of the goal crease;
- c) when a defending opponent, in the judgment of the lineman, could have played the puck before it crossed the red goal line;
- d) when an attacking player who was onside (in the same zone) when the puck was shot down the ice, manages to touch it first; and
- e) when a team is playing shorthanded because of a penalty or penalties.

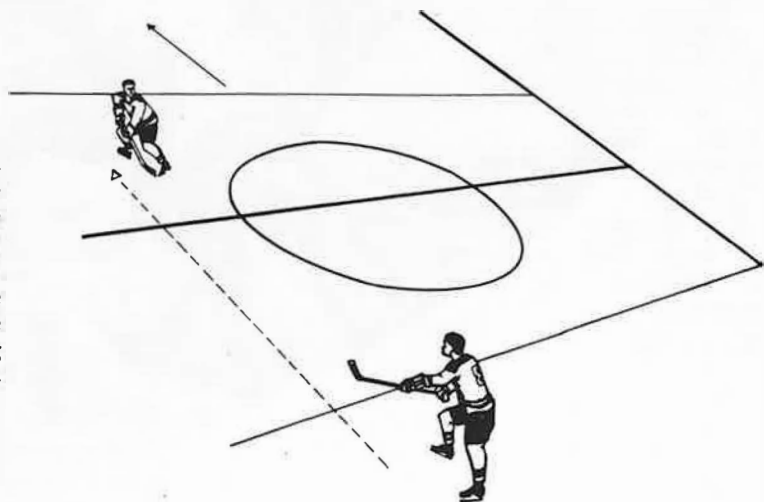
## OFFSIDE

A team is offside when any member of the attacking team precedes the puck carrier over the defending team's blue line. The position of the player's skates and not that of his stick is the determining factor. If both skates are over the blue line before the puck, the player is offside. If he has only one skate over the blue line and one on it, he is onside.

## 3

## OFFSIDE PASS

When a player passes the puck from his defending zone to a teammate beyond the center red line (thus crossing the blue line and the red line) it is an offside pass. The position of the puck (not the player's skates in this case) is the determining factor in deciding from which zone the pass was made.

## COACH AND GENERAL MANAGER

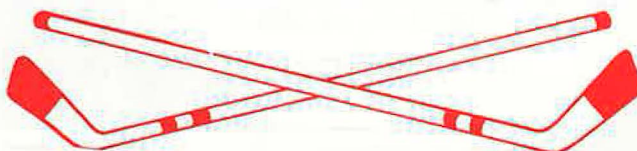
