
WIAA STATE TOURNAMENT EXPANSION

The WIAA Coaches Advisory Committee has been working diligently over the past 6-7 months on a proposal to expand the WIAA State Tournament. The proposal would call for 8 teams making it to state for all 5 divisions. As part of their work the Coaches Advisory Committee recently conducted a survey of both girls and boys head coaches in the state to gauge their interest in this proposal and the results are in.....

There were 440 head coaches who responded to the survey with 400 (90.9%) of the respondents being in favor of the proposal and 40 (9.1%) being against the proposal. We have included some charts below that contain additional information about the survey. The WIAA Coaches Advisory Committee will now bring this proposal forward for an official vote at its meeting in April. WBCA Mentorship Program

Eli Crogan, one of the most respected and successful coaches in Wisconsin as well as a longtime member of the WBCA Executive Board, helped establish the WBCA Mentorship Program. When Coach Crogan passed away in 2022, there was a void for someone to step up and help with the program and something compelled me to answer the call. You see, when I got into coaching, I was a huge beneficiary of mentors in my life. I started my high school coaching career under Forrest Larson as an assistant coach at Badger High School in 2003. Every day of my first six years in coaching, I was privileged to work side-by-side with one of the best coaches in the state (I know, I'm partial). From there, I was able to form my philosophy and learn what it takes to establish and run a high school basketball program. I'm so fortunate for his friendship, his guidance and the chance to learn from him. Later, I was able to forge relationships with Andy Cerroni, Jeff Boos, Andy Banasik, and Kevin Orr to name a few. All in all, these men were mentors to me, and I am forever grateful for the opportunity to get to know and work with such outstanding coaches and people. But I wanted others to have this type of experience.

After making the decision to commit to coordinating the mentorship program, I reached out to Coach Petitgoue to develop a plan of action. He and I called several coaches throughout the state that may be interested in mentoring. These coaches aren't just coaches, they are incredibly successful coaches, and, what's more, they were more than willing to help anyway they could. It is a true testament to their character in that they aren't just outstanding coaches but are also willing to serve. Each year, I reach out to new head coaches to see if they are interested in having a mentor. When they do, I connect them with a mentor based on their needs. Below are some comments from both the mentors and mentees who have participated.

"Since I am no longer an active coach, being a mentor keeps me involved in the game and gives me the ability to continue to connect with coaches throughout the state. I think the mentor program is a valuable resource, whether you're a new coach or have been coaching for many years. Also, with the recent amount of turnover in coaching, I think having someone to bounce ideas off of, ask questions and seek advice, ideas, and resources from is a great way to collaborate and help grow the game. Ultimately, we all want to put our student-athletes in the best position to succeed and have a good experience, and the mentor program allows us to collaborate with our colleagues to do that." – Niki Sutter (Mentor) Oshkosh West Girls

Mentoring isn't just one-sided—it's an opportunity for the mentor and mentee to grow, learn, and challenge each other. Here is why it is important to have basketball mentors: Having a basketball mentor provides invaluable guidance, support, and fresh perspectives. It helps individuals navigate challenges, accelerate personal and professional growth, and gain confidence. A basketball mentor is a resource to help refine skills, avoid common pitfalls, and push boundaries for continued success. A basketball mentoring

program is critical in retaining the next generation of coaches who wish to positively impact today's youth, as there is so much more to leading a program than X's and O's, which most young coaches don't even realize. "Transitioning from parent and longtime basketball official to a first-year head coach was challenging, and I certainly underestimated the overall time commitment involved in this avocation. I often found myself stewing over feedback from disgruntled parents, agonizing over tough losses, or awake in the middle of the night thinking about my own coaching performance. Being involved in the WBCA mentor program and getting connected to Coach Jim Jones was one of the best things I could have done to help manage the season both mentally and emotionally. Coach Jones has been beyond supportive, helping to keep me in the right headspace throughout the season, regularly checking in, and always being available. 

able to attend the clinics in-person or could watch all clinics online through May 1, 2025. In addition to signing up for the clinic, youth coaches would also become members of the WBCA. Developing A Passion for Basketball Officiating

Basketball officiating can be a wonderful, even addictive, experience. We have the opportunity to practice a craft that we love, exercise, and get paid for it. For many referees, officiating basketball is a hobby filled with a great deal of *passion*.

Unfortunately, for some, officiating is strictly a job, and an attempt to work as many games as possible to maximize their income. And, it's obvious in their performance and with their attitude. These officials reflect poorly on those of us who love what we do and take a great deal of pride in putting on the uniform. What's missing with them? *Passion*.

Developing that attitude of excitement starts by associating with other officials that share a characteristic that transcends all potential pitfalls...the *passion* to do their very best each time they put on the uniform. Referees who officiate with *passion* respect the game and everyone associated with it; partners, players, coaches and fans. *Passionate* officials share five basic characteristics.....

- **Hustling and working hard.** There is no excuse for referees that do not give 100%. Hustle is more than running up and down the court. It's moving constantly in an effort to be certain of the best angle for making the call.
- **Knowing and understanding the rules.** This involves constant study and pre-game discussion. This also includes understanding the spirit and intent of the basketball rules.
- **Trusting your partner.** Staying in your primary should always be a point of emphasis. It takes discipline to watch your area while trusting your partner to watch his or her primary.
- **Using good judgment.** This is having a sixth sense for the game. It means having good consistency, making the right call or no call, and understanding the type of game being played and calling the game accordingly.
- **Communicating.** If you want to separate a competent official from an extraordinary one, watch and listen to how he communicates with partners, players, coaches, table personnel, and even parents and fans. Great officials have a calm demeanor and can defuse, rather than escalate a volatile situation.

Finally, *passionate* referees respect every game as if it were game seven of the NBA Finals, even though it may be a sloppy fifth grade game with one team ahead by twenty-five points in the first half. Identifying *passionate* officials is like arriving at a railroad crossing. Stop, look, listen. If you do that, it will be easy to see that passion.

I sincerely hope that others can see the *passion* that you have for the game each time you step on the court.



Miller Time by John Miller

This is an excerpt from the book, *Miller Time*, which profiles the life and philosophy of John Miller, father of Archie and Sean Miller and cousin of John Calipari. Known as an incredibly hard worker and one of the coaches who originated "homework basketball," working on shooting and ball handling drills and skills, this book gives a glimpse into one of the most successful coaches in high school.


- As good as you are today, somebody, somewhere, will be practicing just as hard. What are you going to do to be prepared when you meet that person somewhere down the road?
- From a leadership perspective, people that are successful, no matter what they do, really have a clear vision of what they want to accomplish. But more importantly than the vision, they must have the self-discipline to build a very *prescriptive* plan to get there. So many people have dreams and aspirations for greatness, but few people have the discipline to go through the rigors to get there. That means not only knowing what you want to do, it means planning it out step by step and following through religiously with those plans *every single day*.
- When Miller moved to a new teaching and coaching position, he taught history and would teach several new subjects that he hadn't taught before. "So, all that year he grinded through and made sure he was a success as a teacher first and as a coach second. Though totally against his nature, he knew that basketball had to be a little in




the background at the beginning. He also knew that his credibility would be on the line if he didn't show that he was a quality teacher right from the start.”

- Sometimes the fruits of your labor and the benefits of your toils don't make their appearance until years later. If you trust what you are doing is right, you can't allow yourself to be swayed by the negative messages that are being thrust at you every day.




Cyclone Drag
Iowa State Cyclones




1 dribbles up the right side of the floor as 4 (Niang) moves in to set a drag screen.

Iowa State Cyclones




If 1 doesn't have a shot and 4 isn't open, 1 looks to hit 5 on the "short roll" or pass to 3 in the corner for a 3-point shot.




