USA HOCKEY ARENA CAPITAL CAMPAIGN



THE USA HOCKEY ARENA Capital Campaign, a multi-year initiative aimed at raising funds to help the arena receive critical repairs, entered its second year in 2023-24, and substantial gifts from charitable donors from around the country continue to maintain the campaign's momentum.

The campaign targets a goal of raising \$5 million over a three-year period that will help the USA Hockey Arena maintain and upgrade its facilities to reflect an environment that provides world-class training for our athletes and constituents at all levels.

The USA Hockey Arena encompasses 170,000 square feet with two ice surfaces and serves both USA Hockey athletes and the local community alike. First opened in 1996, the multi-purpose venue based in Plymouth Township, Michigan, was renamed to its current namesake in 2015 when The USA Hockey Foundation purchased the facility. It is home to USA Hockey's National Team Development Program and local club hockey and high school teams. The facility hosts USA Hockey camps, events, and championship tournaments throughout the year.

With the facility approaching the 30-year mark, crucial improvements are required to ensure the USA Hockey Arena can continue to act as the cornerstone of American hockey. The campaign's funding will support functional repairs to both ice rinks, including but not limited to: installing new concrete rink floors, a new refrigeration system, a heat exchanger on the chiller, full plexiglass replacement, and two new ice resurfacing machines. From assessing these important infrastructure updates, to fulfilling the multi-pronged needs of our athletes, associations and fans, the capital campaign marks a crucial effort to continue USA Hockey's mission as a world-leading amateur sports organization.

As part of the campaign, \$2.5 million will be directed to naming the main rink at USA Hockey Arena after the late Jim Johannson. A two-time Olympian, Johannson served as the assistant executive director of hockey operations for USA Hockey until his unexpected passing in January of 2018 at the age of 53. One of the most accomplished and respected people in the hockey community, Johannson was a true visionary of the sport, who championed excellence from USA Hockey's national teams both on and off the ice.

FOUNDATION HIGHLIGHTS

ASPENTECH FUND

The AspenTech Fund was created from a compassionate and generous donation from Mark Fusco in 2007 and annually awards grants to youth hockey players residing in the eastern Massachusetts towns of Bedford, Billerica, Burlington, Chelmsford, Concord, Lawrence, Lexington, Lowell, and Woburn. In 2024, 14 youth hockey players from Massachusetts were awarded grants.



BRIANNA DECKER ENDOWMENT FUND FOR GIRLS HOCKEY

The Brianna Decker Endowment Fund for Girls Hockey was created in 2019 with three-time Olympian Brianna Decker to provide grant awards to 8U and 10U girls hockey programs, focusing on increasing girls participation in the sport. In 2024, grant awards were distributed to Grand Forks Youth Hockey, Lewis Clark Hockey Association, Seattle Junior Hockey Association and Verona Wildcats Youth Hockey Association.

HOCKEY HISPANA FUND

The Hockey Hispana Fund was established in 2021 by the generous philanthropic intentions of Jimmy Dawson and his family to benefit 8U and 10U Latina youth hockey players in Colorado. Two grants were awarded during the 2024 season and covered hockey registration fees for the season, as well as a gift card for hockey equipment.



PATTY KAZMAIER MEMORIAL AWARD

Izzy Daniel, a senior forward from Cornell University and native of Minneapolis, Minnesota, was named winner of the 2024 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award. Daniel is the first Cornell University player to win the honor, which is presented annually to the top player in NCAA Division I women's hockey by The USA Hockey Foundation.

MEMBERSHIP RELIEF FUND

The Membership Relief Fund helps those in need by covering the cost of USA Hockey membership fees for youth hockey players. The fund was originally created during the pandemic and its success continues to assist families around the country. For the 2023-24 season, 1,549 USA Hockey memberships were awarded to youth hockey players, totaling over \$93,000. Of those who received the grant, 542 were 13-18 years old, 675 were 9-12 years old, 259 were 7-8 years old, and 73 were 6 years old or younger.



U.S. HOCKEY HALL OF FAME

The 51st class of inductees to the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame was formally enshrined in December in Boston, Massachusetts. The five-member class of 2023 included Brian Burke, Dustin Brown, Katie King Crowley, Jamie Langenbrunner, and Brian Murphy. Joe Bertagna was named the recipient of the 2023 Lester Patrick Trophy presented by the NHL for outstanding service to hockey in the United States.

JIM JOHANNSON LEGACY FUND

As part of the Jim Johansson Legacy Fund, the winner of the Jim Johansson College Hockey Player of the Year Award selects associations to receive a grant towards youth hockey. The 2024 winner, Cutter Gauthier, selected Detroit HoneyBaked Hokey Club and the Jr. Coyotes Association to receive a \$2,500 grant.

USA HOCKEY MEMBERS GIVE BACK

USA Hockey's members help make the hockey community a more welcoming and inclusive place. There is a direct impact on the sport in the United States when members show kindness and decide to donate to The USA Hockey Foundation when they register for the hockey season. In 2023-24, 23,238 donations were made by our members, helping raise over \$375,000. The impact of donations made at the time of registration is transformational for the sport of hockey.



DONOR SPOTLIGHT

TAYLOR & KATHLEEN LIPSETT



FROM NEW BRAUNFELS, TEXAS, Taylor and Kathleen Lipsett, along with their two daughters Mila and Alina, have dedicated their philanthropic endeavors to growing the sport of hockey, both on and off the ice. Hockey has served as a foundation for the Lipsett family, starting from their high school days in Texas, all the way to the Paralympic Games.

Taylor Lipsett was born with a genetic condition called Osteogenesis Imperfecta, also known as Brittle Bones, resulting in him breaking his bones over 110 times during his childhood and having over 35 surgeries to insert metal rods and repair breaks.

In 2002, Lipsett was introduced to sled hockey shortly after Team USA won its first-ever Paralympic gold medal at the 2002 Paralympic Winter Games. It was in that moment he knew his life was changed forever.

“I fell in love with the sport from the very first time I strapped into a sled and skated across the ice, something I never thought was a reality for me,” Lipsett recalled. Just 18 months later, he was named to the U.S. Under-20 National Sled Hockey Team, and made the jump to the U.S. National Sled Team in 2004, earning a spot on the team that would take home silver at the 2004 IPC Sled Hockey World Championship.

Lipsett’s outstanding 10-year career spanned three Paralympic Winter Games, and included winning gold in 2014 and 2010, along with bronze in 2006. He also made six IPC Sled Hockey World Championship appearances, taking home gold twice (2012, 2009), silver twice (2013, 2004) and bronze once (2008).

Lipsett retired in 2014, but has remained active in the hockey community. Since 2016, he has served on the USA Hockey Board of Directors as an athlete director and been involved on numerous councils, committees and sections during that time. In addition, he currently serves as USA Hockey’s athlete representative on the Team USA Athletes Commission within the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Committee.

“Serving as an athlete director is extremely important to me and serves as a way for me to give back to a sport and organization that quite literally changed my life,” said Lipsett. “Not only does serving in this role give athletes a voice in decisions being made at USA Hockey, but it gives disabled athletes and our Paralympic athletes a voice and a seat at the table with those volunteers and USA Hockey executives who are helping guide the organization today and shape it into the future.”

Recently, the Lipsett family has chosen to further give back to a sport that means so much to them by donating to the Disabled Hockey Fund, which supports USA Hockey disabled hockey programs across six disciplines (blind, deaf/hard of hearing, sled, special, standing amputee and warrior hockey).

“The sport of hockey has given so much to me over the years. Going from a kid in a wheelchair who was told I’d never be able to play sports, to competing on the world’s biggest stage representing my country has led to me being not only a fan of all types of hockey, but a true advocate and supporter of disabled hockey in the U.S. and around the world. The game has taught me so many life lessons over the years that have benefited me while I was playing, in my personal life and professional career, and lessons that I can now pass down to my daughters.

“All sports teach us the value of hard work and determination, how to work together as part of a team, and how to be a great teammate on and off the field of play. Sports teach us not only about our competitive spirit but also how to respect ourselves, our teammates, and our opponents.”



FRIENDS OF WOMEN'S HOCKEY FUND

The Friends of Women's Hockey Fund supports the success of the U.S. Women's National Team program both on and off the ice. Founded in 2017, the fund provides donors the opportunity to support the growth of women's hockey in the United States. Gifts to the fund will directly impact the on-ice success of the U.S. Women's National Team as they train to compete at the highest levels.

The saying "we are part of something bigger than ourselves" is one the U.S. Women's National Team stands by as they play an essential role in showcasing women's sports on the world stage and inspire millions of young girls across the country to play hockey and pursue their dreams.

The U.S. Women's National Team has medaled in every international competition staged since 1990. Team USA has won gold at the Olympics twice (2018, 1998) and ten times at the IIHF Women's World Championship (2023, 2019, 2017, 2016, 2015, 2013, 2011, 2009, 2008, 2005).



DONOR SPOTLIGHT

SCOTT MONAGHAN & BECKY OLSEN

Scott Monaghan and his wife Becky Olsen have donated to The USA Hockey Foundation for the past 12 years. Monaghan, the current assistant executive director of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program and USA Hockey Arena, has oversight of all aspects of the NTDP and the arena. He joined the USA Hockey staff in 1996 and helped establish the NTDP, which after moving from its original location of Ann Arbor, Michigan, in 2015, now calls the USA Hockey Arena in Plymouth, Michigan, home. Monaghan and Olsen have prioritized the future of Team USA by supporting the USA Hockey Arena Capital Campaign.

Monaghan sees firsthand the impact USA Hockey Arena has on Team USA and the hockey community and knows the importance of ensuring the facility appropriately represents the high standards of USA Hockey.

Monaghan said of his donations to The USA Hockey Foundation, "No different than a university, USA Hockey is a non-profit organization, and its Foundation is there to help support initiatives ranging from growing the game, to supporting our national teams and arena. We are proud to support The USA Hockey Foundation, just like we support our alma maters. We believe in consistent giving and know

that our donations to The USA Hockey Foundation will be put to good use to help hockey in the United States."

2026 OLYMPIC HOSPITALITY PROGRAM

ANTICIPATION BUILDING FOR THE 2026 OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES

The countdown is on as anticipation continues to build for the next Olympic Winter Games, which will take place in Italy from February 6-22, 2026.

Milan and Cortina d'Ampezzo will serve as the two main host cities for the Games, with events also planned in several other Italian locations. Italy is no stranger to staging the biggest sporting event in the world, having previously hosted the Winter Olympics in 2006 (Turin) and 1956 (Cortina d'Ampezzo) and also the 1960 Summer Olympics in Rome.

As the sport has continued to grow in the U.S., so too have the number of Americans populating NHL rosters. In 2023-24, the number of U.S.-born players skating in the NHL was a more than 110 percent increase from what it was since the league began its expansion in the 1990s.

OUR BOARD ROOM

LANE MacDONALD



For Lane MacDonald, hockey is more than just a game. It represents a lifelong passion that continues to burn even long after he's hung up his skates. An Olympian and NCAA national champion, MacDonald transitioned from the ice to the board room, attending Stanford University's School of Business after his on-ice career ended at age 23.

He's used his background in finance to guide The USA Hockey Foundation, serving as a valued member of the Foundation's Investment Committee since 2013, before joining The USA Hockey Foundation Board of Directors at the start of the 2024-25 season.

For the MacDonald family, including wife, Wendy, and their three children, Cate, Ben and Maddie, sports has been a cornerstone for their household.

"We are an athletic family. Wendy played ice hockey at Cornell, Cate just graduated from Harvard where she was a member of the crew team, Ben is a sophomore hockey player at Harvard, and also a Seattle Kraken draft pick, and Maddie is a freshman at Duke where she plays on the lacrosse team," MacDonald said. "My father, Lowell, played in the NHL for 14 seasons, so my brother, Lowell Jr., and I grew up racing around the old Igloo Arena in Pittsburgh while my father played for the Penguins. My parents became educators upon my dad's retirement, and my father was the athletic director and hockey coach at the University School of Milwaukee while my mother was the school nurse."

Growing up surrounded by the sport, MacDonald took to hockey quickly and has fond memories

from his time on the ice. "I played for my dad for four years and learned so much from him as he focused intensively on the fundamentals of hockey and less on how many games we played or playing in all the 'best' tournaments. I feel so lucky as the focus was on skating, passing, stickhandling, shooting and scrimmaging."

MacDonald went on to play hockey at Harvard under his coach and mentor, Olympic gold medalist Bill Cleary, before representing the United States at the 1986 World Junior Championship and 1988 Olympic Winter Games.

MacDonald is grateful for how hockey has impacted his life. "I feel so fortunate to have had the opportunity to represent Team USA in international play. My first USA Hockey experience was when I was in high school at the Select 16 Camp in Colorado Springs. It was that exposure that put me on the radar of college coaches as not many schools recruited in Wisconsin at that time. I owe USA Hockey a great deal and as a coach of my son's East Coast Wizards team, I saw firsthand how USA Hockey supports youth hockey in the U.S. ranging from coaching certification programs to the development of the ADM Model - and all of it is done simply to create the opportunity for young boys and girls to have a positive experience in the game of hockey."

"I wanted to find a way to give back to USA Hockey and pay it forward so future generations have the same opportunity that I had," MacDonald said. "Whether that is playing on an Olympic or Paralympic team or simply having the tools to run a great skill development practice for 10-year-olds. I believe that teamwork, competitive intensity, selflessness, resilience, hard work and commitment are among the many important life lessons one learns through the game of hockey."

In addition, MacDonald believes it is the relationships you build with your hockey community that are among the most important gifts you can receive from playing the game. "The hockey community includes so many great people. I have met many of my closest friends and mentors through the game of hockey, and I know so many others feel the same way. Hockey is an amazing community, and I believe that USA Hockey plays an incredibly important role in creating and building this community."

MacDonald and his family continue to go above and beyond for the sport of hockey by donating to The USA Hockey Foundation. Loyal supporters for over a decade, the MacDonald family has supported multiple funds over the years, as a way to give back to the sport that helped shape so much of Lane's life.

"I am a strong believer that the life lessons one learns as an athlete are as important than the lessons one learns in a classroom, so giving back to USA Hockey is very important to me," MacDonald said. "USA Hockey does so much of the important work in building the foundation that allows hockey to grow in the United States. USA Hockey needs our support, and our family is very happy to contribute and give back to the sport of hockey."

GAME-WORN JERSEY AUCTIONS

OVER \$100,000 RAISED THROUGH JERSEY AUCTION SALES

Hockey fans have enjoyed bidding on a part of Team USA history during online jersey auctions hosted by The USA Hockey Foundation. From February to August 2024, the Foundation hosted five game-worn jersey auctions, offering 121 unique jerseys for interested fans to bid on. The auctions raised \$111,130 to support the efforts of The USA Hockey Foundation.

From game worn IIHF world championship jerseys to sweaters signed by Olympic teams, the auctions have offered fans an opportunity to own a part of hockey history. Starting in 2024, the Foundation brought the jersey auction process in house, which allows the organization to provide fans with more auction opportunities and a unique way to support the sport of hockey.

RICHARD MOONEY

Richard Mooney, one of the top online jersey auction supporters for The USA Hockey Foundation, is an avid lover of hockey. After moving to Texas with his family at the age of 10, Mooney attended the University of Southern California, where his love for the sport continued to grow.

Mooney, along with his wife Joan, and their children, have made the sport a foundation of their family. Mooney spent 28 years as a USA Hockey official for youth, travel, and men's league games before retiring from officiating in November 2021.

Looking back on his years as an official, he especially enjoyed his interactions with players and coaches. "Over the years, I became more involved with interacting with coaches and players of the games I officiated," Mooney shared. "When players make a good pass or score a goal, or goalies make an outstanding save, they should be complimented for their efforts."

As an avid bidder on the Foundation's jersey auctions, Richard's financial impact has helped the Foundation fund USA Hockey initiatives through its auction sales.

Mooney has strong emotional ties to hockey and enjoys how he can make an impact on the sport's future. "After our son, Brendon, passed away, officiating kept me busy. I made a commitment that the money I earned from officiating would go toward an endowed scholarship my wife and

I established at Baylor University in his memory. Joan and I regularly attend the Baylor ice hockey games, even with their rink being 225 miles away from our home. We are fortunate to have the opportunity to know some of these players and watch them play."

Mooney enjoys knowing the impact his actions have, especially on a national level, as all purchased jerseys through the Foundation's auctions go directly toward supporting USA Hockey programs. He is especially grateful to the sport as he credits his time as an official with saving his life after a health scare earlier this year.

"I believe officiating ice hockey, playing baseball and football, and staying active saved my life after I recently underwent quadruple bypass surgery. I was able to walk the halls of the hospital on day three without the assistance of any apparatus."



DIVERSITY ASSISTANCE FUNDS

WISCONSIN AFFILIATE ASSISTANCE FUND

The USA Hockey Foundation is proud to help facilitate the Wisconsin Affiliate Assistance Fund that was created through a generous donation from the Laterman Family Foundation, to make the sport of ice hockey more inclusive for youth hockey players of color in Wisconsin. The program provides grant awards to youth hockey players of color who are members of hockey programs affiliated with the Wisconsin Amateur Hockey Association. U.S. Women's National Team player, Laila Edwards, serves as an ambassador for the program.

"It's important to get involved in this program as a way to inspire youth of color to play hockey because to see someone that looks like you playing at this level, inspires them to play the sport as well," Edwards said. Grant awards fund individual player registration fees through their hockey association in Wisconsin and may include funding for equipment.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION FUND

The USA Hockey Foundation received an anonymous gift to create a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Fund to be used for youth hockey players in need around the country. The USA Hockey Foundation is committed to fostering a welcoming environment for all by supporting a diverse, equitable and inclusive game.

BOSTON BRUINS ASSISTANCE FUND

The Boston Bruins are celebrating 100 years of Bruins hockey. In honor of their centennial celebration, the organization created the Boston Bruins Assistance Fund through The USA Hockey Foundation. The Fund aims to make the sport more inclusive and accessible for youth hockey players in Massachusetts.

GRANT PROGRAMS

The USA Hockey Foundation is making an impact on organizations around the country by providing almost \$696,000 in grant awards during the 2023-24 season.



AFFILIATE BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM

The Affiliate Block Grant program was created to help USA Hockey's local affiliates advance the game through funding from USA Hockey. The grant funds are used in a variety of manners, but 25 percent of the funds are directed toward growth initiatives and 15 percent of funds go toward diversity, equity and inclusion. During the 2023-24 season, The USA Hockey Foundation awarded \$243,901 to USA Hockey's 34 affiliates to help them grow and advance the game in their areas.

SAFETY INITIATIVES

The safety of all hockey players both on and off the ice is a paramount priority for USA Hockey. The USA Hockey Foundation awarded \$81,137 in grants to multiple organizations focused on safety in the sport.

Other programs that received grant funding from the Foundation included: American Hearing-Impaired Hockey Association, American Hockey Coaches Association, United Heroes League (Military Youth Grant), USA Hockey Goaltending Leadership Summit, USA Hockey Improving On-Ice Awareness for Safety, and the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Museum. Those grants in total accounted for \$160,000 of support.



HOCKEY IS FOR EVERYONE

The Hockey is for Everyone grant program aims to make the sport more accessible and inclusive for all, while driving positive social change. During the 2023-24 season, The USA Hockey Foundation provided grants to 16 NHL approved Hockey is for Everyone programs totaling \$135,650, helping to create opportunities for underrepresented youth players around the country to lace up their skates.

DISABLED HOCKEY

USA Hockey's disabled hockey section received a grant in the amount of \$75,000 to help fund disabled hockey programs throughout the year. Currently, there are six disciplines supported by USA Hockey, including blind, deaf/hard of hearing, sled, standing/amputee, special and warrior hockey.



GRANT PROGRAM

The USA Hockey Foundation supports numerous efforts each year to help advance programs and initiatives connected with USA Hockey as well as support USA Hockey's Affiliate organizations around the country.

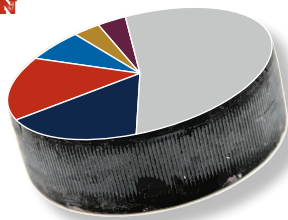
