TODAY'S GAME

The United States and Czech Republic will both be looking to bounce back after Day 1 at the 2021 Para Ice Hockey World Championship. The U.S. and Czech Republic last met at the 2019 Para Hockey Cup quarterfinals, with the Americans winning, 8-0, on their way to claiming a championship. The U.S. has a two-game win streak over the Czech Republic at World Championships, outscoring their opponents 10-2 and 3-0. Group A features the top four teams in the tournament ahead of quarterfinal and semifinal matchups based on the 2019 Worlds final results: United States, Canada, South Korea and Czech Republic.

- TALKING POINTS —

100TH CAREER GAME

Declan Farmer (Tampa, Fla.) is set to play in his 100th career game with USA Hockey. Farmer became the first player in sled national team history to score 100 career goals for Team USA. Farmer has scored 188 points (104-84--188) in 99 career games with USA Hockey, including 47 points in 23 games at Sled World Championships. Farmer recently moved to Nashville, Tenn. after graduating from Princeton University with a degree in Economics.

TAKE PRIDE IN SCORING

Brody Roybal (Northlake, III.) was sprung loose on a breakaway to open up the tournament scoring for Team USA, thanks to a **Josh Pauls** (Green Brook, N.J.) stretch pass in the opening minute of the third period against Canada. Both Roybal and Pauls have Pride Tape on their sticks, and have pledged donations toward LGBTQ+ foundations for every goal and point they score this tournament.

BOUNCE BACK

The U.S. is 3-1-0-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L) following a loss since 2008 in tournament play. In the 13 years since their last back-to-back losses, the U.S. has outscored its opponents, 16-3, following a losing performance. Team USA will look to expand on its fourgame win streak the game following a loss tonight against Czech Republic.

U.S. TOURNAMENT RECORDS

Several members of Team USA are current U.S. record holders in tournament play. **Declan Farmer** holds four scoring records, **Kevin McKee** has two, and **Steve Cash** owns every goaltending record. Additionally, prior to Team USA's 4-1 loss to Canada in the 2017 gold-medal game, the U.S. set a team record with 11 consecutive wins. For more U.S. tournament history, see page 5.

LIFE INSIDE THE BUBBLE

Team USA has undergone frequent testing while in the tournament bubble, spending most of their time in the tournament hotel. Between the hotel and arena, the team is able to see parts of the city, but most of the activity is done within the confines of the hotel space. Players have access to a lounge area to play video games, watch movies, listen to music and play cards. Meals have been provided by the hotel, but the team is hoping to enjoy a bubbled bus ride on its day off on Monday.

JOURNEY TO OSTRAVA

Team USA's journey to Ostrava, Czech Republic, started on Saturday, June 12, with players and staff convening in Newark, New Jersey. From there, the team boarded a plane on Sunday, June 13, and traveled overnight to Vienna, Austria, where the U.S. players and staff boarded a bus for a three-hour trip to Ostrava. Since its arrival, Team USA has held four practices at Ostravar Arena ahead of today's tournament-opening game.

TEAM USA IN WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP PLAY

The U.S. has captured four gold medals in the events' 10-year history and enters the 2021 event seeking a seventh-straight berth to the gold-medal game. This is the third time the event will take place in Ostrava, which hosted the 2009 and 2019 world championships, both resulting in gold medals for Team USA.

LEADING TEAM USA

David Hoff, USA Hockey's Northern Plains District Coach-In-Chief and assistant coach of the gold medal-winning 2018 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team, is in his third season as head coach of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. This is Hoff's fifth season with Team USA after making his debut in the 2016-17 season

Josh Pauls, who has helped the U.S. capture gold medals in the last three Paralympic Winter Games (2010, 2014, 2018), is serving as captain of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. In addition, two-time Paralympic gold medalists (2014, 2018) **Declan Farmer** and **Rico Roman** are serving as alternate captains.

This marks Pauls' 13th season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and his fourth as team captain while Farmer is entering his ninth season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and his fourth as an alternate captain. A Purple Heart recipient and U.S. Army Veteran, Roman is serving as an alternate captain for a third-straight year as he begins his 10th season with Team USA.

PRIDE TAPE

To add a competitive twist, he wants his game to do the talking: \$10 per point he scores, \$20 for every USA win and a \$50 donation if the team wins gold. Teammates **Brody Roybal**, **David Eustace** and **Kyle Zych** have also jumped into the tournament with Pride Tape and promised donations.

When asked about his inspiration for the initiative, Pauls had this to say: "We have a lot of guys who want to give back, and are able to give back. We're all going through that learning process as a team and becoming more educated. We're family on this team. You never know when you'll meet a gay teammate and I want to make sure they're welcomed with open arms."

USA HOCKEY HAPPENINGS

NEW USA HOCKEY PRESIDENT

Mike Trimboli (Massena, N.Y.), who has been involved in grassroots hockey as a player, coach, official and administrator for parts of the last six decades, was elected president of USA Hockey at last week's Board of Directors Meeting as part of the organization's virtual Annual Congress. In addition to his work with USA Hockey, Trimboli, who retired in 2018 from his role in law enforcement with the New York State Police after over 31 years, has also coached public high school hockey for more than 25 seasons over two stints, including from 1990-2005 and from 2009 until today, winning a Division 1 New York State championship in 2014.

DISABLED SECTION LEADERSHIP

USA Hockey, as part of its virtual Congress, elected **Amy LaPoe** (Hamilton, Tex.) as chair of the disabled section, replacing **J.J. O'Connor** (Mt. Prospect, Ill.) who served in the capacity for 20 years. O'Connor' was elected as a director emeritus as well in the Congress session. LaPoe previously served as a Special Hockey Representative for the Disabled Hockey Section, working with special hockey programs around the country to help them grow and develop in order to allow more individuals with special needs to have the opportunity to play hockey. On a national level she developed new tools and resources and represent special hockey within the Disabled Hockey Section.

LaPoe was originally introduced to hockey over 20 years ago when her son, Spencer, wanted to play. Spencer, who has Down syndrome, originally started playing hockey with the Gateway Locomotives in St. Louis, but when the family relocated to the Chicago area in 2000, LaPoe discovered the need for a special hockey team in the area. With the help of the NHL's Chicago Blackhawks, LaPoe founded what is today recognized as the Chicago Blackhawks Special Hockey Team. Since its creation 16 years ago when it was called Tomahawks Special Needs Hockey, the program has grown and now has over 100 members across three locations in the Chicago area. For her contributions to hockey, LaPoe was inducted into the Illinois Hockey Hall of Fame in 2012 and in 2014 the Dick Butkus Foundation named her a Youth Sports Most Valuable Player at the Chicago Sports Legacy Event.

GROWING THE GAME

USA Hockey announced last week two new volunteer positions to its coaching and officiating education structure, including a coach-in-chief for female development and a referee-in-chief for female development. The two new volunteer positions will be filled through the coaching education and officiating education sections of USA Hockey and will serve in a lead role in developing and implementing strategies to advance efforts related to recruitment, retention and overall support of females currently involved or interested in becoming involved in coaching and officiating.
