TODAY'S GAME

Team USA continues preliminary round play of the 2025 International Ice Hockey Federation Under-18 Men's World Championship tonight against Sweden.

Team USA holds an all-time record of 13-3-0-5 (W-OTW-OTL-L) against Sweden in this tournament. The U.S. has won seven of its 10 meetings in the preliminary round, taking its most recent meeting, 6-1, on April 18, 2019.

All of Team USA's preliminary round games will take place at Comerica Center in Frisco, the practice facility of the Dallas Stars. The arena seats 3,500 fans for hockey games.

TALKING POINTS

U.S. VS. SWITZERLAND

The U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team improved to 2-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) at the 2025 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship as **Joey Slavick** (Westland, Mich.) stopped all 26 shots he faced in the win.

Richard Gallant (Concord, Mass.), **Cole McKinney** (Lake Forest, Ill.), and **Will Moore** (Ithaca, N.Y.) each netted two goals, while **LJ Mooney** (West Mifflin, Pa.) added a goal and two assists. Team USA scored six times in the second period alone and outshot Switzerland 50-26 overall.

The U.S. went 1-for-4 on the power play and killed off all three Swiss chances. Slavick was named Team USA's Player of the Game.

LUCKY NO. 6

The U.S. have scored six exact goals in five of its seven preliminary round wins over Sweden.

OUT OF THE GATES

Mikey Berchild (Minnetonka, Minn.) opened the scoring for Team USA at the 2025 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship in the teams preliminary round win over Czechia (4/23). Berchild, an underager for the tournament, became the fourth underage player to open Team USA's scoring in the last 18 tournaments. Cole Eiserman most recently did it at the 2023 tournament where Team USA won gold. Prior to that, Ryan Chesley opened scoring for the U.S. in Frisco, Texas, in 2021, while Jack Eichel did so in 2013.

DOUBLE DIGITS

The U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team beat Switzerland (4/24), 10-0, for its most goals scored in two years. The U.S. last scored 10 goals also against Switzerland in 2023, 10-0, two games after it beat Norway, 12-1, en route to a gold-medal finish. In its last 10 tournaments, the U.S. has scored 10+ goals 10 times, while it has won by 10+ goals seven times.

A FAMILY CONNECTION

U.S. forwards **Casey Mutryn** (Norwell, Mass.) and **Teddy Mutryn** (Norwell, Mass) both represent the 2025 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team. They are the first pair of brothers to skate together for Team USA at the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. Both Boston College college commits, Casey played for the U.S. National Under-17 Team this season, while older brother Teddy played for the USHL's Chicago Steel. Both played for the Boston Jr. Eagles 16U team and St. Sebastian's School last season. Teddy and Casey's father, Scott Mutryn, was signed by the NFL's New England Patriots as an undrafted free agent.

TOURNAMENT INFO

The 2025 International Ice Hockey Federation Under-18 Men's World Championship will take place April 23 - May 3, 2025, in Frisco and Allen, Texas. The U.S. enters the tournament off a silver-medal finish at the 2024 event in Finland. Team USA has earned 11 gold medals in tournament history, the most of any competing country.

Team USA will play its preliminary-round games in Frisco at the Comerica Center against Group B opponents Czechia, Germany, Sweden and Switzerland. The quarterfinal round will be split between Frisco and Allen, while both semifinals and medal-round games will take place in Frisco.

Group A on the opposite side of the bracket consists of Canada, Finland, Latvia, Norway and Slovakia and will play its games at Credit Union of Texas Events Center in Allen.

WATCH ON NHL NETWORK

NHL Network will provide exclusive telecasts of all Team USA games at the 2025 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. The network will air all Team USA games live throughout the tournament, which begins Wednesday (April 23) and runs through May 3 in Frisco and Allen, Texas.

ADDITIONAL NOTES

ROSTER COMPOSITION

The 2025 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team is comprised of the best 18-and-Under athletes in America, from 12 different states. Minnesota leads the way with five players while New York is close behind with four. Twenty-three players are expected to play Division I college hockey. A full list of the 25 players previous teams and colleges committed can be found on Page 4, and additional roster breakdown can be found on Page 5.

BLACK AND YELLOW

LJ Mooney (West Mifflin, Pa.) is skating in his second IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship after he was on last year's team. Mooney is cousins with current NHLer Logan Cooley who played on this stage two times as well. Cooley first appeared at the 2021 tournament that took place here in Frisco, Texas. Cooley then played in the tournament in 2022 as he finished the two tournaments with 12 points (3G, 9A) in 11 games played. Cooley is a Pittsburgh, Pa., native as cousin Mooney hails from West Mifflin, Pa., a suburb outside of Pittsburgh.

LEADERSHIP GROUP

Team USA is led by captain **Asher Barnett** (Wilmette, Ill.) for the 2025 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. Fellow defenseman **Garrett Lindberg** (Moorhead, Minn.) and **Drew Schock IV** (Green Bay, Wis.), along with forward **Richard Gallant** (Concord, Mass.), will serve as alternate captains for the tournament. The four players served in the same capacities for the 2024-25 U.S. National Under-18 Team that played out of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program this season.

A SECOND GO

LJ Mooney (West Mifflin, Pa.) is the sole returner from the 2024 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team which took home silver in Espoo, Finland, at the 2024 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. Mooney skated in all seven games for Team USA and tallied two goals and four assists for t-8th most points on the team last tournament. Mooney had a pair of two-point games as he tallied a goal and assist in the preliminary round against Norway, along with a pair of assists in the quarterfinal round against Slovakia.

FROM THE OUTSIDE

While Team USA is composed mainly of players from USA Hockey's National Team Development Program, six additions were made to the roster that did not come from the program, however, five of the six have skated for the team in some sense before. Both **Will Horcoff** (Birmingham, Mich.) and **Cullen Potter** (Minneapolis, Minn.) were part of the 2024 U.S. National Under-17 Team at the NTDP, while Horcoff played the beginning parts with the 2025 U.S. National Under-18 Team. Potter, at Arizona State University (NCHC), and Horcoff, at the University of Michigan (Big Ten) have tallied 13 goals with nine assists in 35 games and four goals and six assists in 18 games, respectively. At the NTDP, Potter totaled 17 goals and 29 assists in 54 games, while Horcoff tallied 15 goals and 12 assists in 73 games.

Teddy Mutryn (Norwell, Mass.), **Matthew Lansing** (Tonawanda, N.Y.) and **Benjamin Kevan** (Fairfield, Calif.) have represented the NTDP, with all three spending time with the team this season while Mutryn has played with the NTDP both last year and this year. Mutryn joins the team from the Chicago Steel (USHL) where he tallied 17 goals and 13 assists in 47 games this season. He played in the World Under-17 Hockey Challenge last year and played four games with the U18s this season. In total, he's played nine games with one goal and an assist.

Lansing skated with the U18s for six games this year and tallied an assist after spending parts of the season with the Waterloo Black Hawks (USHL) before ending the season with the Fargo Force (USHL). He finished the season with 12 goals and 15 assists in 54 games. Kevan played in four games with the NTDP this year and played 51 games with the Des Moines Buccaneers

(USHL). He finished with 13 goals and 30 assists for 43 points.

Blake Fiddler (Frisco, Texas) rounds out the team as he joins the U.S. from the Western Hockey League's Edmonton Oil Kings. He finished with 33 points this season in 64 games played with 10 goals and 23 assists.

FROM PLAYERS TO COACHES

A few coaches from Team USA's coaching staff will be making it's IIHF coaching debut, however, a trio of coaches have skated once before at this very stage. Although not making his IIHF debut, as he won gold as an assistant coach for the 2023 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team, **Chad Kolarik** (Abington, Pa.) returns to the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship for the third time in total. Kolarik, who played 12 seasons of professional hockey, played for the 2004 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team. Kolarik skated in six games and tallied a goal and three assists on his way to a silver medal. Kolarik went on to skate for Team USA one other time, representing the U.S. at the 2018 Winter Olympics.

Head coach **Greg Moore** (Lisbon, Maine) will be making his IIHF debut, but is no stranger to the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship stage. The 10-year professional sported the "A" for the 2002 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team and appeared in eight games with four goals and four assists and helped the U.S. win its first ever gold-medal at the Under-18 level. Moore skated for Team USA two more times, both at the World Junior Championship, and helped Team USA once again win its first gold medal at that level with the 2004 team.

Finally, assistant coach **Ryan Hayes** (Syracuse, N.Y.) will be making his return to the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship, his first time behind the bench but his third time overall. Hayes represented Team USA at both the 2006 and 2007 tournament, playing as an underager for the 2006 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team. In 13 total games, Hayes tallied two goals and three assists, along with bringing home a gold in 2006 and a silver the following season. Hayes went on to play 13 seasons of professional hockey.

RUNS IN THE FAMILY

Although it'll be the first time **Cullen Potter** (Minneapolis, Minn.), **Will Horcoff** (Birmingham, Mich.) and **Donny Bracco** (Freeport, N.Y.) will represent Team USA at an IIHF event, it won't be the first time their last name is seen on the back of an IIHF jersey.

Jenny Potter, mother of Cullen, has represented the U.S. on 14 different occasions with 10 Women's Worlds appearances and four times representing Team USA at the Winter Olympics. She played 71 games total for Team USA, with 50 at Women's Worlds and the other 21 at the Olympics, and tallied 34 goals and 59 assists for 93 points. She's played in the medal round for all 14 tournaments and has amassed five golds (one Olympic, four Women's Worlds), eight silvers (two Olympic, six Women's Worlds) and one Olympic bronze.

Donny Bracco's older brother, Jeremy Bracco, has represented Team USA at this very same stage back in 2015. Ten years ago, Jeremy skated in all seven games, tallying three goals and 10 assists, en route to a U.S. gold medal. Jeremy then represented the U.S. at the 2017 IIHF World Junior Championship, skating in all seven games once again with three goals and two assists and another gold medal.

Although not the U.S., Shawn Horcoff, Will's father, represented Team Canada at three different Men's Worlds with two golds and one silver. In 27 games played, he tallied seven goals and nine assists for 16 points.
